

CRESSON TEAM WINS MEDALS

Distinction Not Enjoyed by Any Other Branch in Altoona Meet

CRESSON—Cresson division athletes of the Pennsylvania Railroad company made an unusually fine showing Saturday in the company's meet at Altoona. Each entrant from the Cresson division captured a medal in the final events in Altoona. Cresson was the only division to achieve this distinction. The points won by the athletes from this place were credited to the Eastern region's total in the meet. Miss Margaret McCarthy finished in fourth place in the girls 100-yard dash event and was a member of the girls relay team which captured first place at the meet. Joseph Connell captured third place in the running broad jump, with a leap of 19 feet 10 1/2 inches. The Cresson division rifle team, shooting under the colors of the Eastern region, captured third place with a total of 329. Altoona works won the shot with a total of 365. LAST MONTH'S HEALTH REPORT

Only 107 Contagious Cases Reported for August. None Here.

There were 107 contagious and communicable diseases reported in Cambria County last month, according to health records announced on the month by County Medical Director W. E. Matthews, of Johnstown. Of this number, 45 cases were reported from Johnstown. The total number in the county is considered very small by health authorities. In Johnstown there were only 84 deaths reported in August and of this number 14 were non-residents, according to the report of Health Registrar D. T. Edwards. Dr. Matthews' report for last month follows: Diphtheria—Rural 13, Franklin 2, Hastings 3, Johnstown 11, Nanticoke 6; Measles—Rural 5, Conemaugh 1, Johnstown 5; Pneumonia—Rural 1; Scarlet Fever—Rural 1, Conemaugh 2, Fernside 1, Franklin 1, Johnstown 2, South Fork 1; Typhoid Fever—Rural 1, Cresson 1, Hastings 1, Johnstown 1, Lily 1, Westmont 1; Tuberculosis—Rural 2, Johnstown 3; Whooping cough—Rural 4, Dale 2, Ebensburg 1, Fernside 2, Franklin 1, Hastings 1, Johnstown 9.

Erecting New House.

NANTY-GLO—Ground has been broken by the Healey Coal Company for the erection of a number of new houses on Fernin Hill, located above the new site of houses owned by the company. Departments to Cooperate.

HARRISBURG—A cooperative arrangement between the Departments of Highways and Forests has been made. It was announced, whereby facilities in each department are made available to the other.

In case of forest fires, highway employees are placed at the disposal of District Foresters as well as motor equipment, and the Highway Department is reimbursed for the expense.

Signs and posters to be erected along State highways, through permission granted by Secretary Wright giving precautionary instructions with respect to care of State forests. Brush along State highways is to be removed so as to eliminate a dangerous fire hazard.

The Department of Forests and Waters offers to the Highway Department in the co-operative scheme the use of stone, sand and construction materials from forest lands and grants rights of way through forests.
