

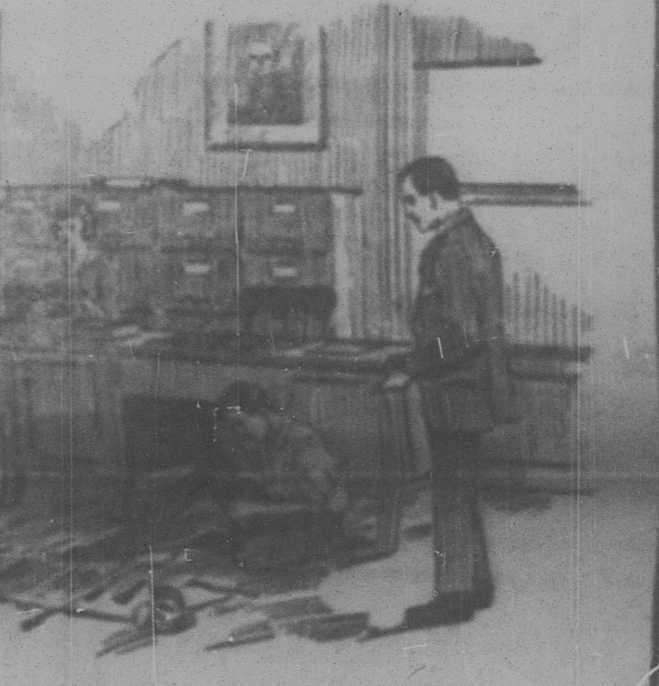
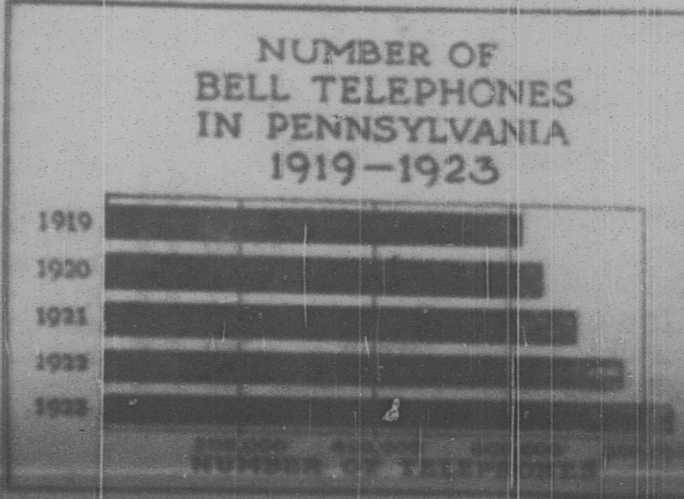

FARM CASES—The best results will be obtained where the hives are kept with others that feed at approximately the same time.

Storing Potatoes—Potatoes should be taken out to pile potatoes too deep in storage, especially without proper ventilation. It may cause black spots to appear in the tubers which lower their value as table stock.

Minerals for the Dairy Cows—A practical way to feed minerals to dairy cows is to allow free access to a mixture of one part of salt to four parts of bone flour.

Thinning the Woodlot—Now is the time to begin thinning the poor trees out of the woodlot to give the good trees a better chance. It is a good deal like eating the cake and having it too, for the thinnings make wood grow and a better woodlot is the result. This work can be started as soon as the corn is in the crib.

Treating Calf Scours—A simple remedy when used for calf scours is lime water. Cut the food to one-half and add a pint of clear lime-water for a feed or two, then bring the calf gradually to full feed again.

Bees Hints—The Italian bee is the only race worth cultivating. Their characteristics are: uniform honey production, resistance to European foulbrood, good wintering qualities, gentleness and low swarming tendencies.

Combined Age of Four 124—GREENSBURG—Four children whose combined ages total 124 years, those being by 27 years the four famous Floodwood brothers of Greensburg, Ind., whose combined ages are claimed to be 215 years, is the child of Mrs. E. J. Gorman of Greensburg in behalf of his mother and three aunts Mrs. Susan's relatives and their ages are: Mrs. Sara Robinson, of 101, 82, Mrs. Lydia Walters of Delmont, mother of Mrs. Gorman, 82, Mrs. Hetty Bloss of Delmont, 81, and Mrs. Margaret Walker of Delmont, 81. The sisters are in the best of health and perform light household tasks.

Delight Slightly Followed—WARRINGTON—Rumor of the past few days have somewhat alleviated the drought situation throughout the county, but many farmers are still waiting water for the stock on their farms. Many animals died up during the drought and all wells were shut down due to lack of water. At Warfield a big chemical plant has been shut down for some time, while at Warfield and Clarendon residents have been forbidden to wash their automobiles. The situation is unprecedented in this section.

Women Held For Whiskey Making—ERIE—Erie prohibitionists are discovering that the "moonshiners" have arrived. In their latest raid they found women operating stilling plants in their homes. The agents seized the stills, a large quantity of moon shine whiskey and only 500 gallons of mash. Elizabeth Lachowski and Helen Cushman were arrested and each gave bail for \$1,500 to a hearing later.

Held For Flipping Girl Pupil—BELLVILLE—Alleged to have whipped a girl student, Rose Jordan, then to have slapped the girl's married sister, after the latter had attacked him with a window weight. H. W. King, a teacher in the local high school, was held by court on a charge of assault and battery following. According to the testimony, King was called upon to reprimand Miss Jordan and the reprimand was in the form of a whipping. The chastened young woman immediately left school and went to the sister's home, and the indignant sister is alleged to have gone to the school and, following an argument, she is alleged to have at-

knocked the teacher with a heavy window weight, whereupon he beat her off with his hands.

ENJOINTOWN—The shooting of James Hatfield in a house at Grindstone on October 18, was declared accidental by a coroner's jury at an inquest here. It was notified that Hatfield drew a revolver when several men attempted to eject him from the house, where a party was being held. Hatfield was killed when the revolver was accidentally discharged.

ERIE—Fishermen and like men were requested by Street Director Theodore Eishorn not to pick up small

buoys placed in Lake Erie, off Erie Harbor. The buoys and floats are being placed by city engineers in studies of currents in connection with the new interceptor sewers. As fast as they have been placed the engineers have discovered that fishermen are picking them up greatly handicapping the engineers in the work.
