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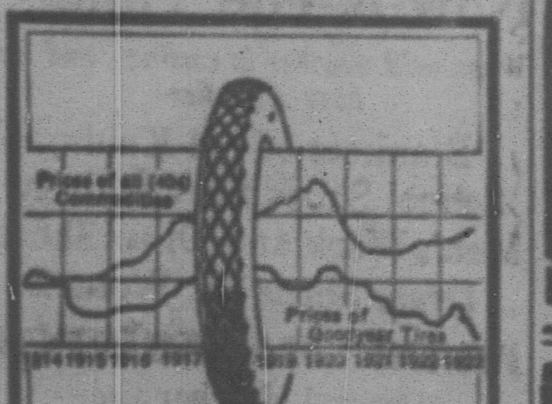
Cambria County Paid \$30,000 In Gasoline Tax

HARRISBURG—Motorists during July, August and September, the period of extensive touring throughout the State, used 151,956.978 gallons of gasoline, purchased from the two-cent tax announced at the State Treasury Saturday. Philadelphia and Allegheny paid \$224,202.63 and \$222,985.97 respectively. Some of the other large contributors were: Cambria \$30,193.36; Chester \$25,499.28; Delaware \$25,811.99; Erie \$25,853.81; Fayette \$22,746.29; Lackawanna \$39,496.47; Lancaster \$36,671.86; Lebanon \$12,444.67; Luzerne \$40,547.48; Luzerne \$42,377.84; Montgomery \$47,686.92; Schuylkill \$27,663.59; Washington \$22,194.35; and Westmoreland \$17,465.36.

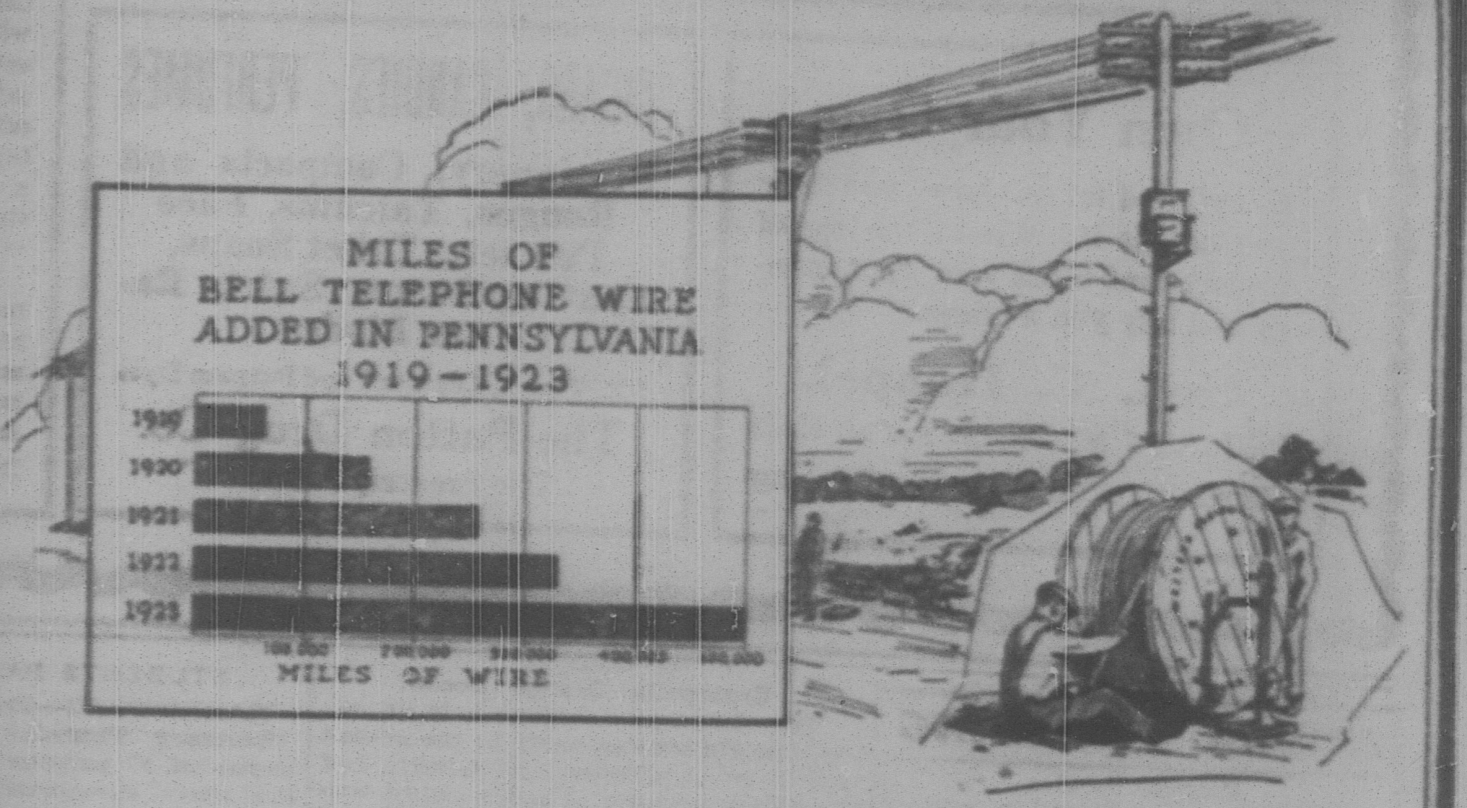
