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COUNTY WILL AID CITY FOR BRIDGES

Appropriate \$247,200; One-Half Cost of Erecting Three Structures

The County Commissioners while in session Monday agreed to contribute from bond funds \$247,200 to be applied towards the erection of three bridges located in the City of Johnstown. It is to be especially understood that the county shall not be liable for the maintenance of the bridges, nor for any damages, direct or consequential, relating in any manner to the erection and construction of said bridges, or that they be designated as county bridges.

The County Commissioners have made the appropriation upon the recommendations of the grand jury, during the September term of Court. The grand jury was of the opinion that the erection of the same would require more expense than it is reasonable for the city of Johnstown to bear.

County Commissioner William J. Cavanaugh, of Johnstown, has instructed County Engineer Frank H. Dorr, to proceed with the opening of the Prospect road, connecting Good's corner with the Johnstown city line at once.

The following appropriations were made by the County Commissioners towards highway improvements in various sections of the county:

The sum of \$16,000 for the Borough of Ebeneburg for the construction of 725 feet, beginning at Julia street, on the north side of Highland avenue, and extending a distance of 453 feet along Julia street and beginning on the north side of Highland avenue and extending a distance of 273 feet along the lane leading to the borough reservoir.

Upper Yoder township will receive the sum of \$20,000 towards the construction of 1,465 feet of improved highway, beginning at the Millcreek road, near the Sturman schoolhouse, and extending in the line of Lower Township known as Edwards Hill road.

The sum of \$28,000 has been appropriated to Elder Township to be applied towards the improvement of 15,824 feet of highways in said township, beginning at the borough line of Hastings and running northerly to the Clearfield County line, on what is designated as Route No. 211.

Upon motion of County Commissioner William J. Cavanaugh, which was seconded by Commissioner T. Stanton Davis, Cambria Township will receive the sum of \$20,000 towards the improvement of 12,500 feet of highway in said township, known as the Johnstown and Clearfield roads, known as Lehigh.

Upon a petition presented to the County Commissioners by the Supervisors of East Taylor Township, representing that a section of highway in said township being about 17,000 feet in length and situated along the Johnstown city line to the cross roads, known as Lehigh.

ROAD BIDS ARE RECEIVED BY COUNTY COMMISSIONERS. Bids were opened yesterday morning at the County Commissioners' office for the construction of three sections of highway in the county, Twenty-Gio, Twenty-One, Franklin and Upper Yoder townships.

J. L. Egan of Ebeneburg submitted the lowest bid for the work in the Twenty-Gio township. His bid price is \$48,700. The Twenty-Gio proposed improvement is to include the construction of 2415 feet of highway, 25 feet wide, and 15 feet in height. The proposed improvement is to be built of reinforced concrete, extending from the Clearfield road west on Second street to the borough line.

Other bids for the Twenty-Gio work were: Vignard & Shipston, of Johnstown, \$50,074.54; McGraw, Inc., Johnstown, \$50,782. The contract has not yet been awarded, pending action of the Borough Council of Twenty-Gio.

The bid tender for the proposed improvement in Twenty Township was \$48,700. The contractor is the Cambria Construction Company, of Cambria. Other bidders were: J. L. Egan, of Ebeneburg.

The section in Reade Township begins at the Blair county line, running northwest to Lehigh street, in Blainburg, a distance of 12,515 feet. The road is to be 18 feet wide and constructed of reinforced concrete. This contract has not yet been awarded, pending the decision of the Road Supervisors of Reade Township.

R. H. Vipond, of Holidaysburg, submitted the lowest bid for the construction of the Upper Yoder Township section of improved highway, known as the Lehigh Pike, a distance of 12,244.9 feet. The highway is to be constructed of reinforced concrete, the width of the highway being 18 feet. Mr. Vipond's bid for the work was \$124,628.88. Other bids submitted were: James Nicholson Company, Johnstown, \$144,467.25; Bell Buckel Company, Johnstown, \$133,294.25; Crissey Construction Company, Johnstown, \$112,406.75; Paul Construction Company, Crescen, \$112,725; Moore and Ringer Company, Johnstown, \$110,153.30.

The Commissioners have taken the bids for the Upper Yoder Township work under advisement.

CAMBRIA MEN SEEK PARDONS

Cases of Antonello, Alberter and Bushik Will Come Up Soon

HARRISBURG—Application for a pardon for Daniel Antonello, Cambria county, now serving a term of imprisonment in the Western penitentiary having been found guilty of felonious shooting with intent to kill, will come before the state board of pardons in session here Wednesday and Thursday. This will be the last session of the board for 1923.

Antonello was sentenced Dec. 3, 1919 to pay a fine of \$50, costs and imprisonment in the Western penitentiary from four and one half to five years.

Charles Alberter, Cambria county, serving time in the Western penitentiary, having been found guilty of robbery and sentenced May 1, in seeking a pardon. His case will come before the board at this session. He was sentenced to pay a fine of \$500 and costs and imprisonment from four and one-half to five years.

Joe Bushik, found guilty of felonious assault and battery on two counts and sentenced March 18, 1919, to pay a fine of \$10, costs and imprisonment in the Western penitentiary from 31 to 33 years, is seeking a pardon. His application will come up at this session.

Coal Output Falls Off. ALTOONA—Pennsylvania coal production in the Western Pennsylvania field fell off during November. Only 37,874 cars were loaded, as against 63,490 cars in October. The demand for substitutes for local coal has resulted in considerable business at these operations at which the cost is high.

Distillery Robbed Again. BROWNVILLE—For the second time within a week bandits robbed the Vandegrift distillery near here. Monday night and got away with 27 cases of bonded whiskey valued at \$2,000. According to guards at the plant the thieves cut a hole in the wire fence and made their way to a warehouse where they looted a lock and carried the whiskey to their automobile.

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
