"On the Federal Reserve Bank of New York; check letter 'C' plate number 114121; W. G. McAdoo, secretary of the treasury; John Burke, secretary of the United States; portrait of Lincoln. Apparently printed from two etched plates on two pieces of paper between which some blue silk threads have been distributed. The workmanship is very poor.
