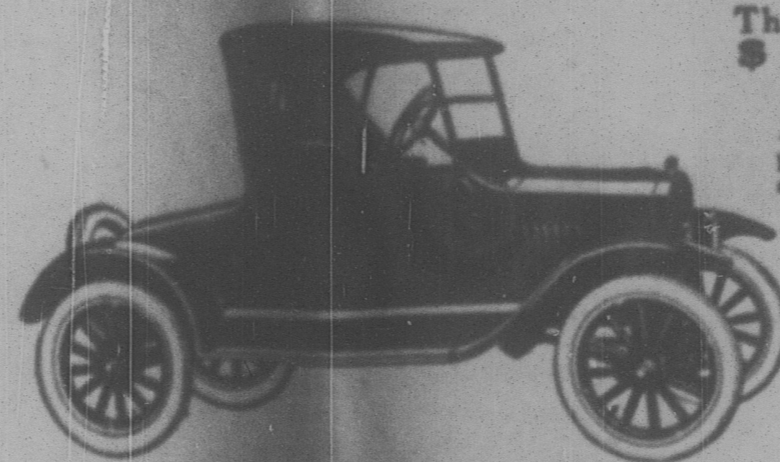

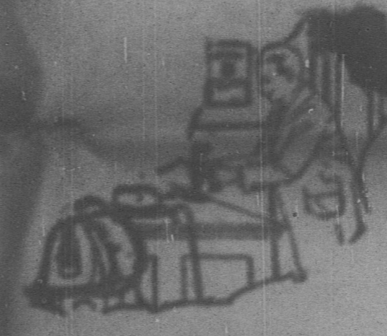

TAX COLLECTORS AT BARNESBORO

Law Committee Presents Tentative Suggestions to Take Before Legislature

NEXT MEETING SEPT. 9

Barnesboro endorsed the Cambria County Tax Collectors' Association at the Municipal Building Tuesday. The association was in session for over two hours and the officers report one of the most enthusiastic sessions yet held by that body.

The most important feature of the meeting was the recommendations of the Law Committee. This committee appointed by the President, D. S. Custer, at the last meeting of Cresson, presented many tentative suggestions which the association by State-wide effort will try to have embodied in laws at the next session of the Legislature. The association feels that the present laws have loopholes which the tax "cheaters" are able to "puzzle through." Many of these loopholes will be closed up, if the Cambria County Association, with the aid of the associations all over the State, carries its program to a successful end. Among the most important of the suggestions which will benefit the taxpayer who tries to pay his taxes on time, is that which will have all taxes, city, school, borough, road, county and township, become due and payable at the same time, and have the same become delinquent at the same time. At present all these various taxes are due at different times and this has a tendency to confuse.

President Custer reported at the meeting of a neighboring tax collector named Beckley, of Paint Borough at Soap Level, having a unique experience with several women in his district who refused to pay their occupational tax. There were four in all and the collector hired an auto to take the entire lot to the Somerset County Jail. One paid the collector before she got in the car and the other three were promptly taken to the county bastille. On arriving at the jail, they would not submit and were promptly incarcerated. They stayed at the jail two days and then asked for their lawyer, in Windber, who promptly came. His advice was for them to pay the taxes and go home, which they promptly did. The original tax was \$3.74 for such woman and when they had reached home the trip cost each one of them \$11.64, including the fee of the lawyer.

It was announced that the association had lost its suit in the mandamus proceedings with the County Treasurer in the matter of the local tax collectors collecting the county taxes throughout the county. The association, however, feels that public sentiment is with them in this on account of the demand from many of the taxpayers to have a centralized agency to which they look to pay all their taxes.

The next meeting of the association will be held in the Grand Jury room at the Honesburg Courthouse on Tuesday, September 8.
