The appeal has been filed with the superior court. What effect the possible dismissal of the other charges may have upon the matter of bail pending the superior court's action, remains to be seen.

Judge Faltner having specially granted at the trial in June, action on the motion for dismissal will have to come from him.

Twenty-eight of the alleged participants in the Lilly case are serving jail sentences. Twelve Lilly men who were arrested were released on bail when the twenty-eight were sentenced July 1, by Judge Faltner.

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COMPENSATION CARES ARE HEARD AT COUNTY SEAT.

Forgiving Question of Which one of the Two Feet Was Injured Arises at the Hearing.

Compensation before Judge Taylor heard a number of claims for compensation last week at hearing held in the court house, when several cases throughout the north of the county were presented.

Among the cases heard by Mr. Taylor was that of John Valle, seeking continued compensation from the Springfield Coal Mining Company of Monty-Glo. It is claimed that a mistake was made in the recording of an injury sustained while employed by the company some months ago.

According to the records, Valle's left foot was injured, but he now claims that it was his right foot. Physicians who testified claim that his right foot is permanently disabled.

Cases that were heard included that of John Bekack against the Lincoln Coal Co., and the State Insurance fund, and John Burch against the Vinton Colliery Co. and the State Insurance fund.

The Elizabethtown Coal company made a claim to the effect that compensation had been paid to John Gil under an agreement, and that the man is able to return to work again. However the man cannot be found to sign the release and asked that a termination of the case be granted.
