DECORATION DAY IN PATTON TO BE FINELY OBSERVED

Walter McCoy Post, American Legion Will Have Charge of the Services.

TO VISIT THE CEMETERIES

Plans of the officers and members of the Walter McCoy Post, of the American Legion, of Patton, provide for an adequate and fitting tribute to the silent heroes dead at this place on Saturday.

A call is made for the appearance of all ex-service men, whether members of the Legion or not, to appear at the Legion Hall in the Good building by nine o'clock on Saturday morning sharp. The hats for the Legion members have arrived and can be secured from Adjutant Fred Kinloch at the post office.

Citizens and organizations of the community are also urged to appear in the parade to take part in the parade to the cemeteries, where the graves of the soldier dead will be decorated with flags, and salutes will be fired over the graves. Following the ceremonies here, the Legionnaires will honor the dead in the cemeteries at St. Augustine, St. Augustine and Chest Springs.

It is the desire of the Legionnaires, closed during the morning of Memorial Day.

Cars will be provided for taking the mother and fathers of the deceased soldiers to the cemeteries on Saturday, and the cars will call at their homes for them.

Street flags will decorate Patton on Memorial day. The places for putting the tri-colors have been prepared in charge of the local Legion post. The emblems are set in receptacles made of concrete in a steel tube in the center to receive the poles, and about seventy of them were purchased by business men and property owners of Patton. The receptacles will be made to endure for many years if properly cared for.

The flags are 4x6 feet and the poles 12 feet in length. The streets will present quite an air of patriotism when the flags are unfurled.

Notice to Flag Owners. It is requested by the American Legion that all flags on display on Decoration Day be at half mast until 12 o'clock, and at top mast until the balance of the day. The flag should be half-mast during the funeral of any ex-service man, or any other day of mourning. Flags should be taken in between 6 and 6:30 in the evening, so no flag is supposed to be out after sundown. Committee.

ORDINANCE NO. 165

AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR THE PAVING OF MAGEE AVENUE FROM THE BRIDGE CROSSING CHEST CREEK EAST TO THE BOROUGH LINE, CONNECTING WITH STATE HIGHWAY NO. 221, LEADING TO ALTOONA.

An Ordinance of the Borough of Patton, Cambria County, Pennsylvania, providing for and authorizing the grading and paving of Magee Avenue, in the Borough of Patton, from the bridge crossing Chest Creek, in an easterly direction to the Borough line, connecting with State Highway leading to Altoona, and providing for the collection of the cost of the same.

WHEREAS, The Municipal officers of the Borough of Patton, are desirous of grading, paving and otherwise improving Magee Avenue from the bridge crossing Chest Creek, in an easterly direction to the Borough line, connecting with the improved State Highway leading to Altoona, and providing for the collection of the cost of the same;

WHEREAS, The Commissioners of Cambria County have entered into an agreement to contribute the sum of twenty thousand dollars toward the grading, paving and otherwise improving of said street, the balance to be paid by the Borough of Patton and the petitioners owners adjacent to said improvement, as is authorized by law, and herein provided for; And,

WHEREAS, The Borough of Patton has accepted said contribution from the Commissioners of Cambria County, and agreed to proceed with the work of reconstructing said street as rapidly as possible; And,

WHEREAS, The Borough of Patton with the use of County aid and general Borough funds, will have sufficient money to improve the whole of said street to the width of sixteen feet; And,

WHEREAS, Two thirds of the property representing not less than two-thirds in interest and number, owning property on said street, beginning at the bridge crossing Chest Creek and extending in an easterly direction six hundred feet be graded, paved and otherwise improved to the width of twenty-eight feet, and that the extra cost of improving said street over sixteen feet wide, be assessed to the property owners adjacent to the same; And,

WHEREAS, The property owners adjacent to the same, have petitioned the Council, that said street, beginning at the bridge crossing Chest Creek and extending in an easterly direction six hundred feet be graded, paved and otherwise improved to the width of twenty-eight feet, and that the extra cost of improving said street over sixteen feet wide, be assessed to the property owners adjacent to the same; And,

PATTON IS THIRD IN SCHOOL TRACK MEET

Two Records Are Broken By the Local Boys, and List of the Honors is Given.

The Patton High School Boys stood third in line for the boys cup at the conclusion of the annual track meet of the schools of Cambria county, held at Ebensburg last Saturday. Charles Welty and Leslie Watters were the stars on the Patton team, the former breaking the record of the boys' running broad jump, taking first place by a distance of 19 feet, three inches, while the latter broke his former record in the one mile run taking first place in a time of four minutes, 44.15 seconds.

The Boys' Relay Race was won by the Patton High Boys in a time of 3 minutes, 47.15 seconds. The relay team was composed of Charles Welty, Walter Bortman, Richard Catherwood and Leslie Watters.

Much credit is due to the coaches, L. T. Bots, Jack Oiler and Ted Charleton, of the local high school faculty, who trained the local lads for this contest. From the appearance of the athletes before, during and after their respective events, it was not hard to see what this training did for the boys. The best style shown by any school's athletes was certainly seen in Patton's.

Barnesboro took the track meet, and Ebensburg was second, leading Patton by but a single point.



LAST HALF MILLION OF BONDS ARE SOLD

The sale of the last 500,000 of bonds of the issue of \$4,500,000, authorized several years ago, for roads and bridges, was awarded Monday by the board of county commissioners to W. H. Newbold, Son and Company of Philadelphia, on a high premium of \$12,149.95. The bid was considered exceptionally high. The commissioners explained that the money coming from the sale of these bonds will not be available for any new road work in the county. The money already has been spent or appropriated, the amount having been borrowed from the general fund.
