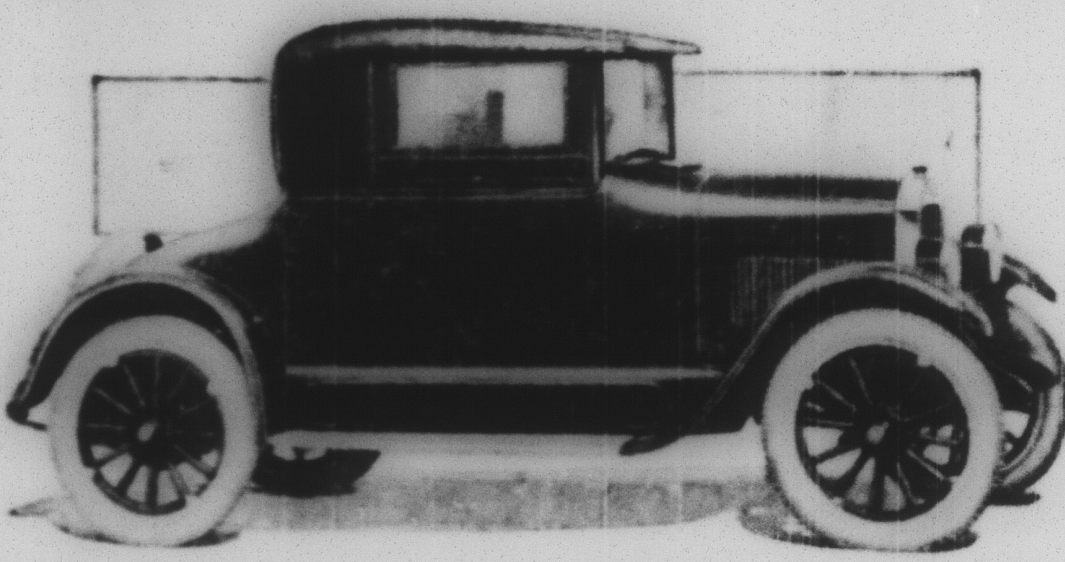


STRIKING FEATURES OF NEW STAR COUPSTER

ECONOMY REIGNS ON CAPITOL HILL

End of Two-year Appropriation Period Finds All Departments Running Close

BETTER SHOWING IN FUTURE

Interesting News Items, Briefly Condensed, Picked Up At The Department Which are Of Interest To The People Of The State.

Harrisburg, Pa.—Approach of the date of the first two-year appropriation period is responsible for some of the economies under way in various departments on Capitol Hill and not only have traveling expenses been cut to a minimum but no more supplies or printing are being ordered than are absolutely necessary.

The appropriation period, nearing its end began with June 1923, just before the administrative code was in operation and the changes in the system of handling money, which sums were allocated for all purposes brought about drastic changes, some of which caused much lamentation.

The showing for the next two years will be even better because of acts devoted to insurance, Agricultural and other departments money turned in through license system under their control as in the case of the Highway Department with motor vehicle licenses and the Banking, Game and Fisheries Departments.

Commercial vehicles have risen from 341,629 on April 15 last year to 338,039 the same day this year. The revenue from registrations has climbed to \$14,239,960 against \$12,635,665 a year ago.
