Spangler Man Tells of Plan That Would Bring Old Time Fishing Days Back to Us Again

CONSERVE THE FRESH WATER

To the Editor of the Courier:
For several years Pennsylvania has been recognized as one of the foremost states in the Union in regard to conservation of game and fish. The following plan would be put into action if it would rank first in fishing in a few years.

No more can the bare foot boy of a few years back take a cat of worms, an eel or a willow pole and go off along some creek to catch a mess of fish. When I look back to the time when I had the above privilege, there is nothing that has happened in the past that gives me more pleasure than to think of my early fishing experiences. Boys don't only benefit by what they catch but they are out close to nature where they breathe fresh air, where they are given a chance to grow up to be real men.
Every year the poisonous sulphur water from some new mine is being stripped the fresh water streams that used to be the home of countless numbers and kinds of fish, until now just a few real, fresh water streams are left.

Take Cambria county—While I am not a sportsman, I am a conservationist. I know of at least twenty good streams in which game could be conserved. Many of these places are the same as some of our large willow dams of a few years back. We should have the sportsmen of Cambria county put one of these dams in each county each year. Look what that would mean in ten years in Cambria county. Take them back at it on a larger scale. Suppose each county in the state were to follow our example in ten years but having these places stocked by the state. Pennsylvania would be ahead of every state in the United States of America for good fishing. In speaking of such a plan to a few business men in town at a recent tea of their friends to give \$100 each for such a plan. Just look at the amount that could be raised if all the sportsmen of Cambria county could be caused to contribute of such a plan. We could have a general fund that if enough money could be raised to build two dams this year that would be better. Let us conserve our fresh water supply and give the boys of the future a chance to go out and catch some fish. Also if this plan were followed we could soon get our share of stock hunting. Another thing if every county in the state would adopt this plan in a few years the increased water area would take an important part in eliminating our annual droughts. This plan cannot be put into effect by the sportsmen of one town. Let us show the rest of the state that Cambria county is ahead and take the lead. I would like to hear from one of the other sportsmen. Talk this over with your friends. Let us arrange a meeting of all the Cambria county sportsmen. I would like to have a meeting of all the sportsmen of the county. Let us make this the greatest fish section in the world. I would be pleased to have letters from other sportsmen to see if some plan to carry out the above is possible.

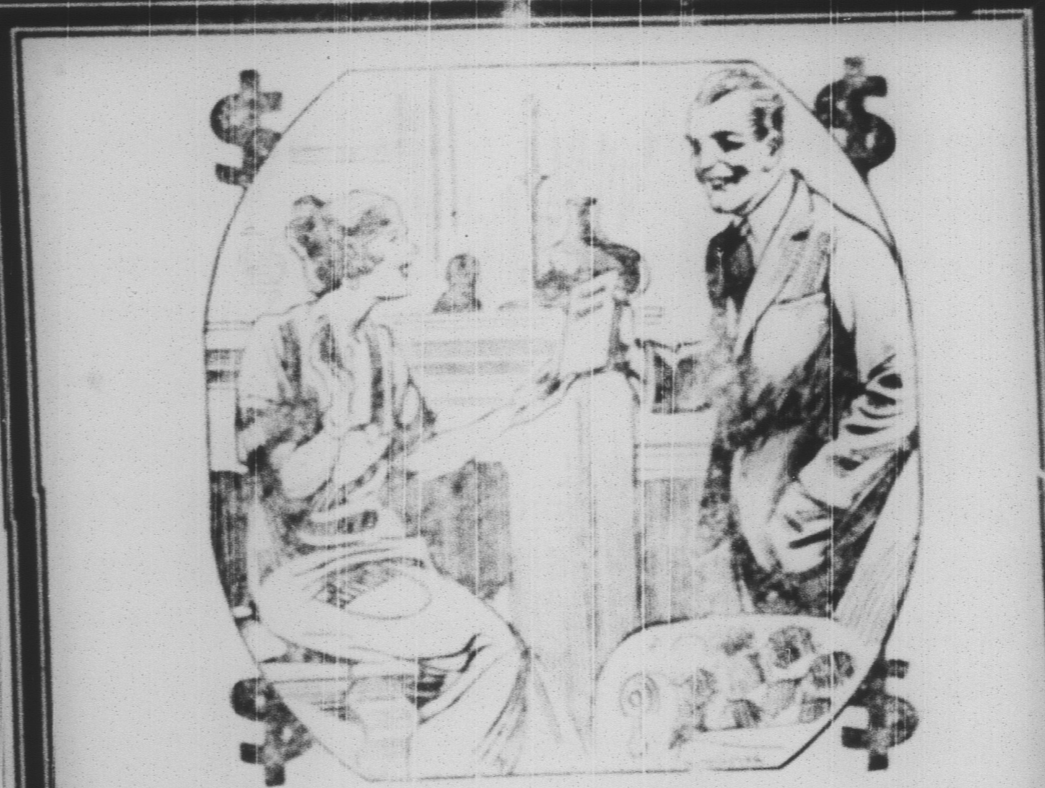
Mr. and Mrs. Isidore Horne and son, Earl, were recent visitors in Patton.

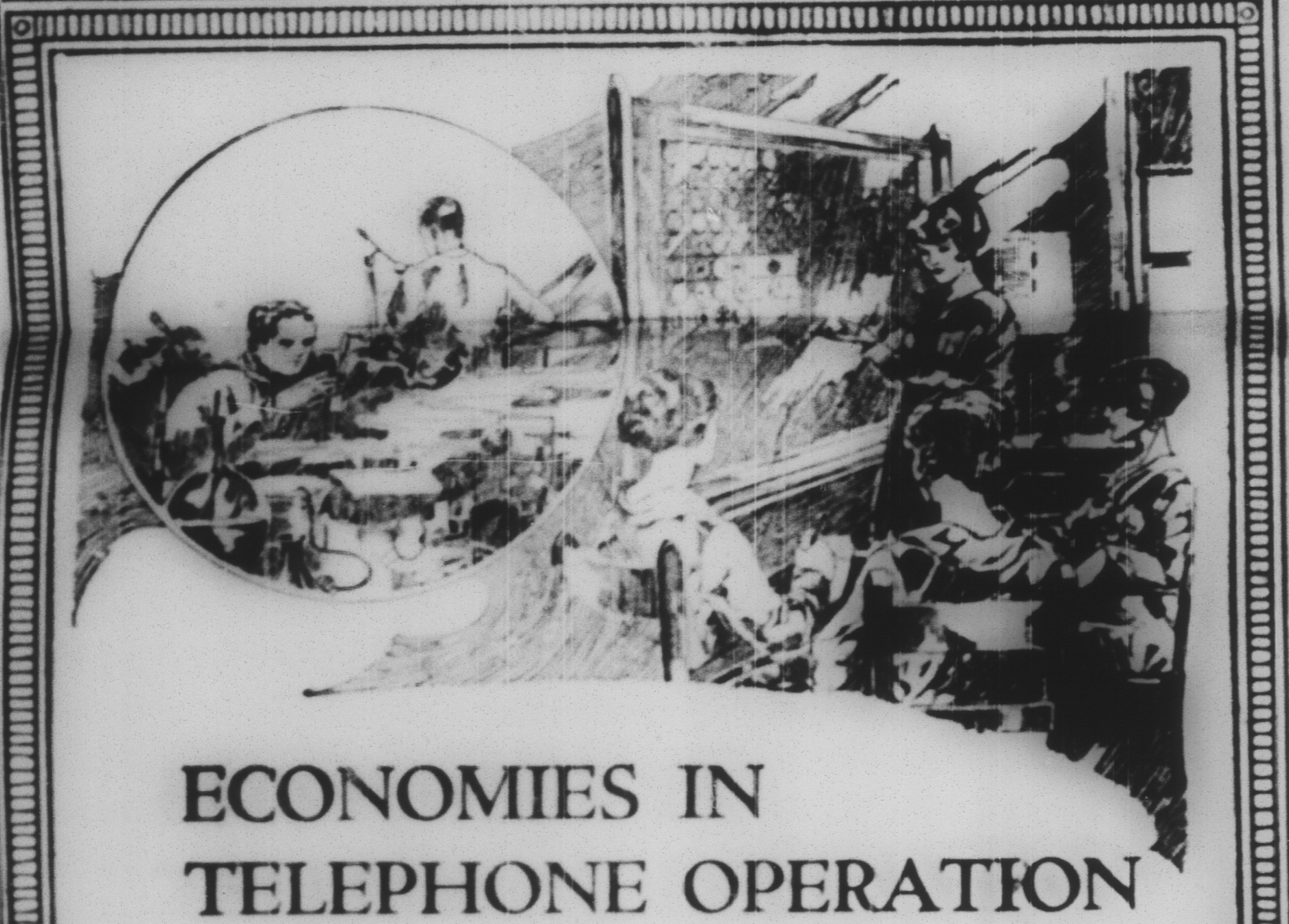
