**TWO MOTORISTS TO  
SERVE JAIL TERMS**

Yard Stover, pleaded guilty in Monday evening before judge S. A. Reed to operating a motor vehicle without license and to driving on a public highway without license. He was sentenced to serve six months in the county jail, with hard labor included in the other sentence. His sentence was ordered to run from the date of his conviction.

Joseph A. Nelson, pleaded guilty to the same offense and was sentenced to six months and three days in the county jail, with hard labor included in the other sentence. His sentence was ordered to run from the date of his conviction.

The Cameron County Court has put itself emphatically on record as holding forth no leniency to violators of the automobile laws, and defendants convicted on charges of driving while intoxicated have been repeatedly told to look for no mercy. Jail sentences are imposed whether or not injury or damage has been done.

Sam Martin, pleaded guilty to violation of the liquor law and was sentenced to pay the costs, a fine of \$100 and to undergo imprisonment in the county jail for not more than three years nor less than six months, three having been advised that the defendant was charged in the sale of liquor for beverage purposes.

Jacob Trylan and George Labat pleaded guilty to possession of liquor and were sentenced to pay the costs a fine of \$100 each and to serve not less than one day nor more than 3 years in the county jail.

Roy Henry, pleaded guilty to an offense against morality and was sentenced to three months in jail, with hard labor included in the other sentence.

Arthur Horvath, charged with an offense against morality, pleaded not guilty and was discharged to the court at the conclusion of the case.

Marion was found guilty of an offense against morality but was not sentenced, pending disposition of a motion for a new trial.

Ernie Werner was found guilty of an offense against morality and was sentenced to pay the costs and a fine of \$100.

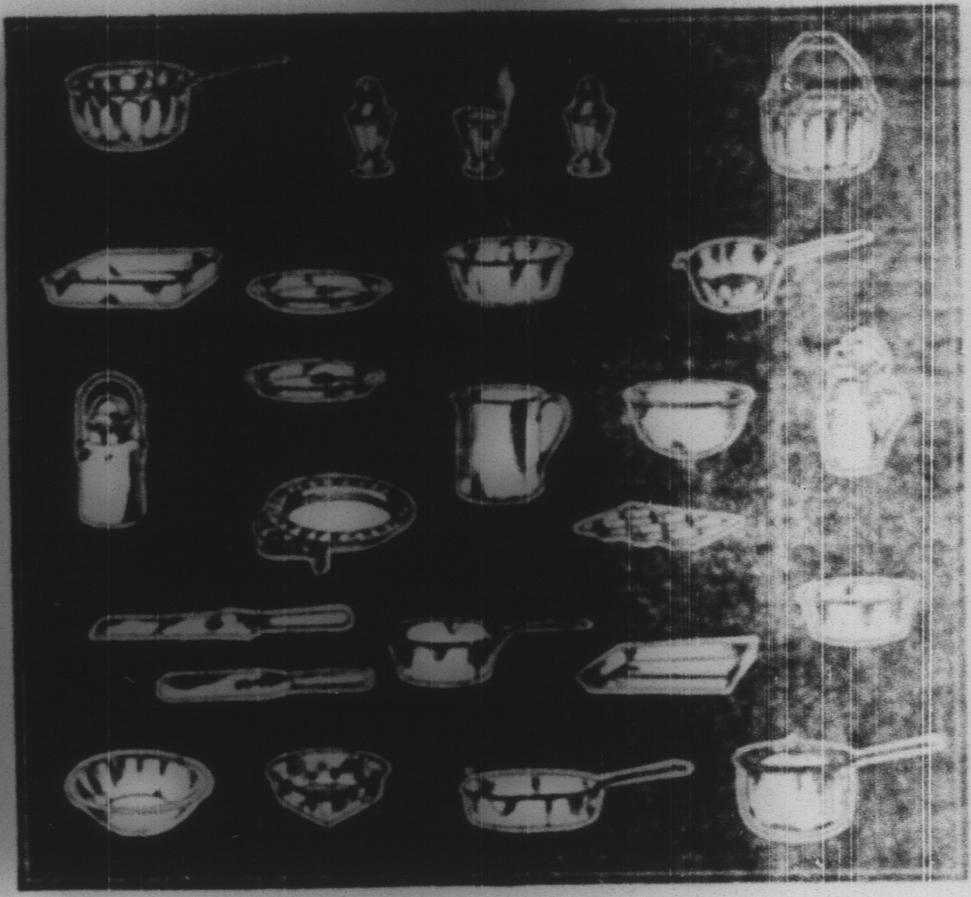

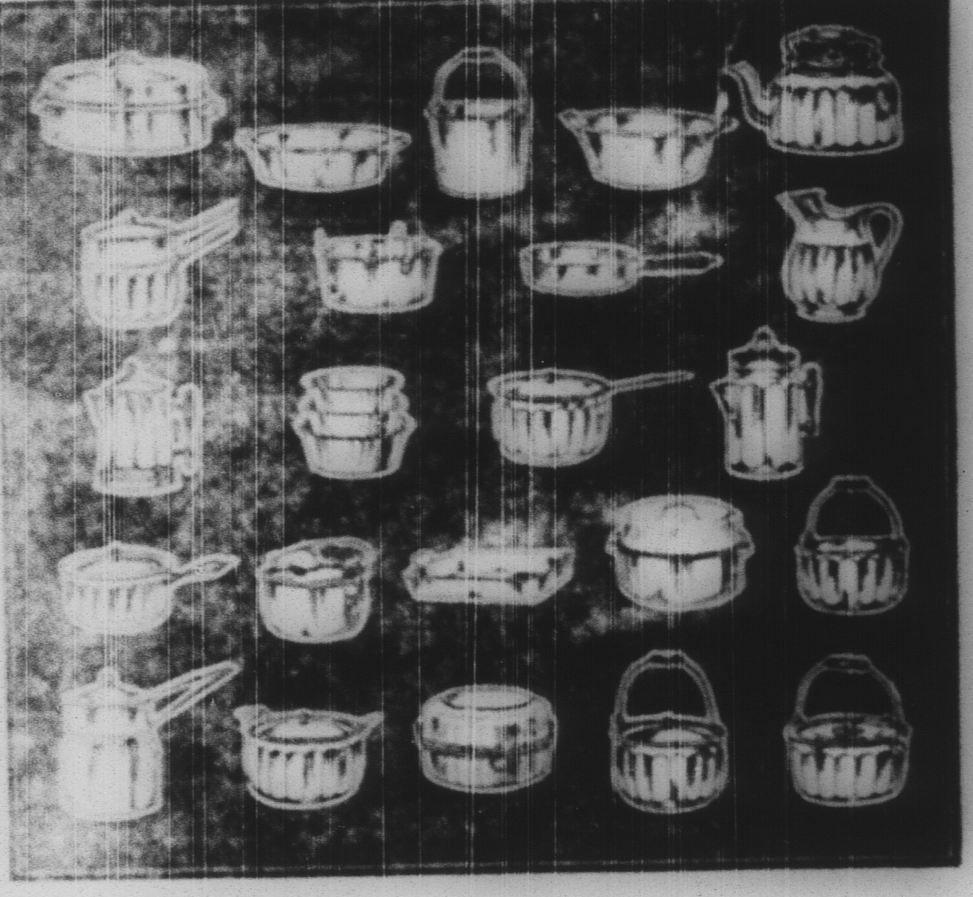
