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## KIWANIANS HAVE DAY ON COUNTY FAIR'S PROGRAM

### Members of Three Clubs At A Dinner With Mr. Schwab Last Monday Evening.

#### PATTON CLUB IS "STRONG"

Cambria County Kiwanians from Johnstown, Ebensburg, and Patton tangled with Cambria County Fair on Monday night at a dinner at Half-Way Inn, Charles M. Schwab, principal speaker, and an honorary Kiwanian, making the main address in a program which included a number of musical treats by Mrs. N. A. Young and Herbert L. Roberts, of Ebensburg, and addresses by Justice Kephart, of the supreme court; H. D. Kittell, treasurer of the fair; H. D. Bowers, secretary; Ira Bloom, manager and Blair C. Seeds, president; Attorney Reuel Somerville, the president of the local Kiwanians; A. B. Critchley, president of the Johnstown Kiwanian Club; and Harvey T. Patton, president of the Ebensburg Kiwanians, who planned the dinner, spoke for their several organizations.

Mr. Schwab, who had been away from Loretto for several days, was full of his own enthusiasm for Cambria County and for Johnstown. He recalled some of the statements made several years ago concerning his aims and his hopes for the future of the Bethlehem Steel Corporation mill at Johnstown, and again made the declaration that he will make Johnstown's the biggest and best steel producing plant in the country.

By a motion adopted enthusiastically by the 112 Kiwanians present, the president of each of the three organizations was directed to name two members of a committee to have charge of Kiwanian activities at the fair this year. This committee is to make all arrangements for a Kiwanian day.

It was agreed that the Cambria County Fair is large enough in its scope, and especially in the character and number of exhibits of horses, cattle, hogs, sheep and poultry, to draw large attendance from a territory much greater than Cambria County, and that one way to make this known and bring to this attendance is through organizations like Kiwanians.

Johnstown, which founded good will to the Johnstownians until they learned that there were 20 Kiwanians from Patton. The rest were from Ebensburg.

## PROCURATOR OF LORETO SCHOOL DIES IN IRELAND

The Rev. Father Bernard Lynch, T. O. R., member of the Franciscan order, who was ordained at the chapel of the Sisters of Mercy at Cresson in 1919, died on June 22, at the home of his brother in Tullystown, county W. Meath, Ireland, word of his death being received at St. Francis' College last week.

With his brother, the Rev. Father Linus Lynch, T. O. R. and his sister, Miss Bessie Lynch, Father Bernard left New York June 6th to visit his native land after an absence of 22 years. He was taken seriously ill after a few days spent in Ireland. The Rev. Father Bernard entered the Franciscan order 24 years ago. He was professed in Spalding, Nebraska, in 1908, later coming to St. Francis College. At the time of his death Father Bernard was procurator of St. Francis college and assistant Master of Novices.

## ALL PRIESTS IN DIOCESE INSURED BY GROUP PLAN

About 100 priests of the Altoona diocese will be insured for the amount of \$5,000 as the result of a plan worked out between the Rt. Rev. J. McCourt, Bishop of the Altoona diocese, and the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company. This plan is unique in the history of the Catholic church, a group of priests never having before been insured in this manner.

The diocese and the individual priests will each bear half the expense, and two beneficiaries will be named in each policy, half going to a personal beneficiary and the other half going to a Catholic charity, of the designation of each individual policy holder.

Another insurance plan has been worked out by a Catholic institution, the graduating class of the Holy Cross College, having insured all of its members to the amount of \$5,000. The policies will mature in 25 years and the money will be used to establish a \$50,000 endowment fund for the college.

The funeral services took place at nine o'clock on Wednesday morning when a high mass of requiem was celebrated in St. George's Catholic Church by the pastor, the Rev. Father Adrian, O. S. B. Interment was made in the St. Boniface Catholic Church Cemetery at St. Boniface.

Mr. Good's death was due to perforation. He had been working in a typewriter factory at Hartford for the past several years. Besides his parents, Mr. Good is survived by one brother, Peter Good, of Philadelphia, and a sister, Mrs. Verena Butajls, of Patton.
