ADOPTION LAW TO ALTER PROCEDURE New lines of procedure in Orphan's Court cases of adoption went into effect July 1, in accordance with the act of 1925 wiping out nine con-fusing and defective laws that have held until the present time. The handling of small children in-volving foster homes through-out the state and often irregular adoption processes, has been a thing of com-mon occurrence, Charles Edwin Fox, of the children's commission, declared in a statement. Adoption abuses have been respon-sible for much misery and the wreck-ing of many lives. Young children have been subjected to neglect, hard-ship and worse because of the lack of proper adoption safeguards and the exercise of discretion by the author-ities handling their cases. Adoptions under the new system are to be made through action of the Orphan's Court on fixed lines of pro-cedure, with entries of facts and de-termines on the court records. Among provisions of the new law are: 1.—Adopting persons must be ad-ult citizens of the commonwealth. 2.—Declaration by adopting citi-zens in petition to court that they will perform all the duties of parent. 3.—Information concerning birth, age, marital status, etc., of adopting parents and those conceding adop-tion. 4.—Consent in writing from persons to be adopted, if over 12, and all persons responsible in any way for the adoption. 5.—Hearings may be held and tes-timony taken to set forth facts in-cluding testimony of persons other than parents interested. 6.—Investigations may be ordered by the court to verify statements in the petition or for information about a case.
