FIVE MEN FROM CAMBRIA DIE IN ELECTRIC CHAIR

Should Michael Barzi and Tony Pezzi, sentenced to die in the electric chair for the murder of James Garman in the pay roll robbery near Colver last fall, pay the supreme penalty in September, their executions will make seven from Cambria county since the Rockview death chamber was established.

Both men were granted stays of execution pending an appeal to the state supreme court, which was refused and their only hope now lies in an appeal to the state board of pardons.

The two men are in two cells on the second floor of the death house, and are doomed to spend the summer in them. Unlike some other states Pennsylvania does not send its murderers immediately to the death house when they are sentenced. Usually they remain in prison in the county in which they are tried until a day or two before the execution date. When a reprieve is granted after a man has reached the penitentiary he may remain in the death house for some time. Rarely, however, are there more than two or three prisoners in the death house for one time.
