THE UNPAVED LINK OF PERMANENT ROAD

From the Barmesboro Star:
 The unpaved link between Ashville and (West) Springs on Route 221, is causing much consternation among the good roads enthusiasts in Barmes- boro and vicinity, inasmuch as it fails to give the north of the county a com- plete hard-surfaced road to Altoona. The unpaved link is but two miles of

of the State, and its improvement de- pends entirely upon the disposition of the State authorities. The im- provement of the two-mile unpaved stretch of permanent high- way from Cherry Tree, via Barmes- boro, Carroltown, Patton, to Altoona, West Route 6 is completed to Belle Landing, all that section will be pro- vided with a short route to Altoona via Barmesboro and the Buckhorn.

It is hoped that the State Highway Department will consent to make this much needed and greatly desired improvement this season, in view of the benefit that would accrue to a large population. The State should not permit travel and traffic to be embarrassed by reason of this short bit of road. It should set to work and complete the needed im- provement at once.

The Buckhorn road to Altoona is a distance of 27 miles from Barmes- boro via Patton. It will provide the north of the county with a short cut to the mountain city, a much desired route, and the state has been consid- ering these short routes when they represent such a northern as northern Cambria, and has ordered roads built.

We have a scenic route to Altoona via Cresson, which is 15 miles farther, suitable one to travel, yet when a motorist has but one object, to reach a given point on the shortest length of time which means less mileage, he is not thinking of scenery and beauty spots. When a motorist is out sight- seeing he unquestionably will take the Cresson road to Altoona, but on the other hand, when time is to be gained and when it means a savings of 15 miles, he will take the shorter route.

The shorter route to Altoona is needed and as it represents an ex- penditure of only a few thousands dollars at this time, we cannot understand why the state has held up the project as long as it has. Business folks espe- cially ask that the road be complet- ed and it is hoped the state will grant us this two mile stretch and have same constructed before winter sets in.

CONTRACT AWARDED FOR NEW VINTONDALE ROAD

The Fort Pitt Construction Co. was the lowest bidder for the contract of the construction of the road from Vintondale connecting with improved

highway at Twin Rocks, the bid was \$136,533.

The Vintondale-Twin Rock road was recently taken over by the county commissioners and will be built by the county, without State or Town- ship aid. The contract will not be awarded, it has been stated until all releases of property damages have been obtained.

Morgan of Johnstown \$155,555; Lord Construction Co. of Hastings, \$160,990.50; Clark Bros. Construction Company of Indiana, \$146,011.40; M. M. Shesely of Johnstown, \$144,863.
