SOUTH FORK YOUTH ADMITTED TO BAIL

Benjamin Facciani Obtains Release on Murder Charge; Habeas Corpus Hearing. Benjamin Facciani, aged 19, of South Fork, charged with murder as the result of an automobile collision, was released on bail on Thursday evening of last week following a habeas corpus proceeding heard by the three members of the Cambria County Court. Those killed in the automobile accident, which occurred along the Cresson-Gallitzin road on September 15th, were Mr. and Mrs. Leroy Maxwell of Fortgate, and Francis Clark of Gallitzin. It was charged against Facciani that he was driving at an excessive rate of speed, estimated by one witness as between 50 and 60 miles an hour. In attempting to pass another car, it was testified he struck the rear wheel hub cap and caused the Maxwell car to swerve into the ditch. His own car was wrecked in a short distance after it struck a pole. Facciani was driving at the time. County Detective Whitted testified without a license. When asked, following the accident, to produce his driver's certificate, he gave a learner permit which had expired. The defendant had been in jail from the time of the accident until last Thursday evening. He will be tried at the December term of court.
