ISAIAH SHERBINE DIES AT WILMORE

Isaiah Sherbine, a prominent resident of Wilmore, passed away at his residence there last Friday following a long illness of a complication of diseases, in the 80th year of his age. The funeral was held on Sunday afternoon and interment was made in the Sherbine burying ground.

PAYMASTER PLEADS GUILTY TO HOLDUP

Arthur Etienne, former paymaster for the Emmons Coal Company, near Barnesboro, and Edward Kelly, who assisted him in a staged "robbery" of the Emmon Coal Company the afternoon of November 29 last, pleaded guilty to a charge of larceny in court at Ebensburg on Monday last, and were sentenced to pay the costs of prosecution, make restitution, and to serve not less than one year nor more than three years in the county jail.

The two men stole about \$3,300 from the coal company. Etienne told a story that he had been held up and the money taken from him. Etienne was found in the coal company office, bound with a rope, but a piece of the rope was discovered in a drawer in a desk in the office. The police also learned that the revolver found on the floor and which Etienne said had been used by the bandits, was property of Etienne.

Both Etienne and Kelly were placed under arrest shortly after the alleged hold up and both confessed that they had planned the crime themselves. All but \$300 of the money has been restored.

Alex Papielensky pleaded guilty in court to a charge of manufacturing and possessing liquor and was sentenced to pay the costs and a fine of \$100.

J. Amster, arrested in Johnstown, on a charge of selling obscene literature, pleaded guilty in court, but was not sentenced pending a further investigation of his case. The Court wanted to know if the charge that Amster had distributed literature was true, and indicated that if it was the defendant would be given the limit.

A number of motions and petitions were heard in court on Monday.

Scene at Kentucky's Great Cave Drama

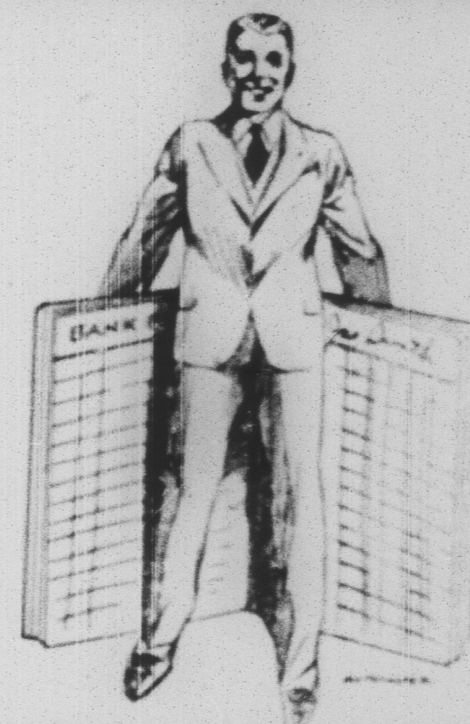

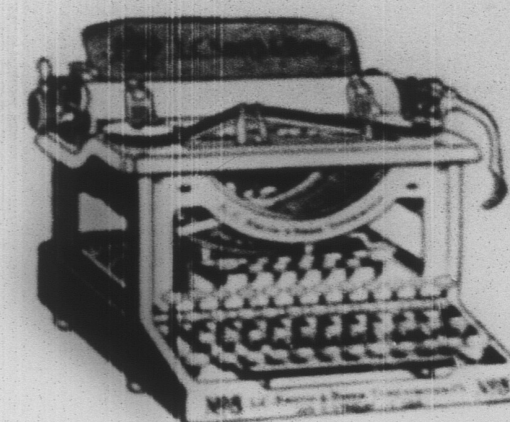
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
