EXTENSIVE PLANS FOR ANNUAL EXPO

And Also for the Cambria County Fair Are Made By the Fair Officials.

Extensive plans for an industrial exposition July 2, 3 and 4 and for the annual fair the week of September 3, both at the Ebsenburg fair grounds...

Practically complete arrangements for both the exposition and the fair were submitted to the management. Both programs have been considerably enlarged over last year and the directors approved budgets looking to larger exhibitions than so far attempted...

Charles M. Schwab, who recently returned to Letort to spend the summer, presided at the meeting. Mr. Schwab was enthusiastic over the prospects of the Fair Association for this year.

The industrial exposition which was held for the first time last July, showed remarkable progress. Nearly 100 exhibitors already have signed for space and within a short time it is expected that all available space in all buildings on the grounds will be taxed to capacity.

In addition to the exhibits the fair management has contracted for considerable entertainment for the July exposition. A complete vaudeville and circus bill has been arranged for, and the annual horse show has exceeded original plans.

There will be three days of horse racing at the exposition. The directors approved action of the fair management in doing away with all horses racing this year at both the exposition and the fair, substituting running or jockey races. This action is in line with most of the big fairs in the country and is expected to prove extremely popular.

The building of a new horse barn, now under construction and completion of the large steel building erected last year through the construction of a concrete floor, were approved by the directors.

H. Frank Dorr, secretary, was elected a delegate from the Fair Association to Pennsylvania State College for the purpose of electing trustees of that institution. Mr. Schwab is one of the trustees.

COURT IS ASKED TO APPOINT TRUSTEES Judge John H. McCann presided at a court session of court on Monday morning at Ebsenburg to hear motions and petitions. Court was adjourned shortly after the opening to observe Memorial Day.

Attorney Morgan Evans, of Ebsenburg presented a petition for Evan J. Toman of Jonestown, asking for the appointment of trustees for the Salem Calvinistic church, located along the Carrolltown-Ebsenburg road, in Cambria township. The petition asks that the church become extinct Sept. 18, 1924, and that there are now no active or resident trustees. The church was an unincorporated congregation, acting under the Calvinistic Methodist Synod, and the petition asks that the trustees of this organization be appointed to take over the property. The court granted a rule to show cause why these trustees should not be appointed. This is returnable the second Monday in July.



Mrs. Maddison was born in Sandler, Iowa, England in 1846. She was married twice, her first husband, John Storey, passing away about forty or more years ago.


