Both Appearance and Arrangement Please

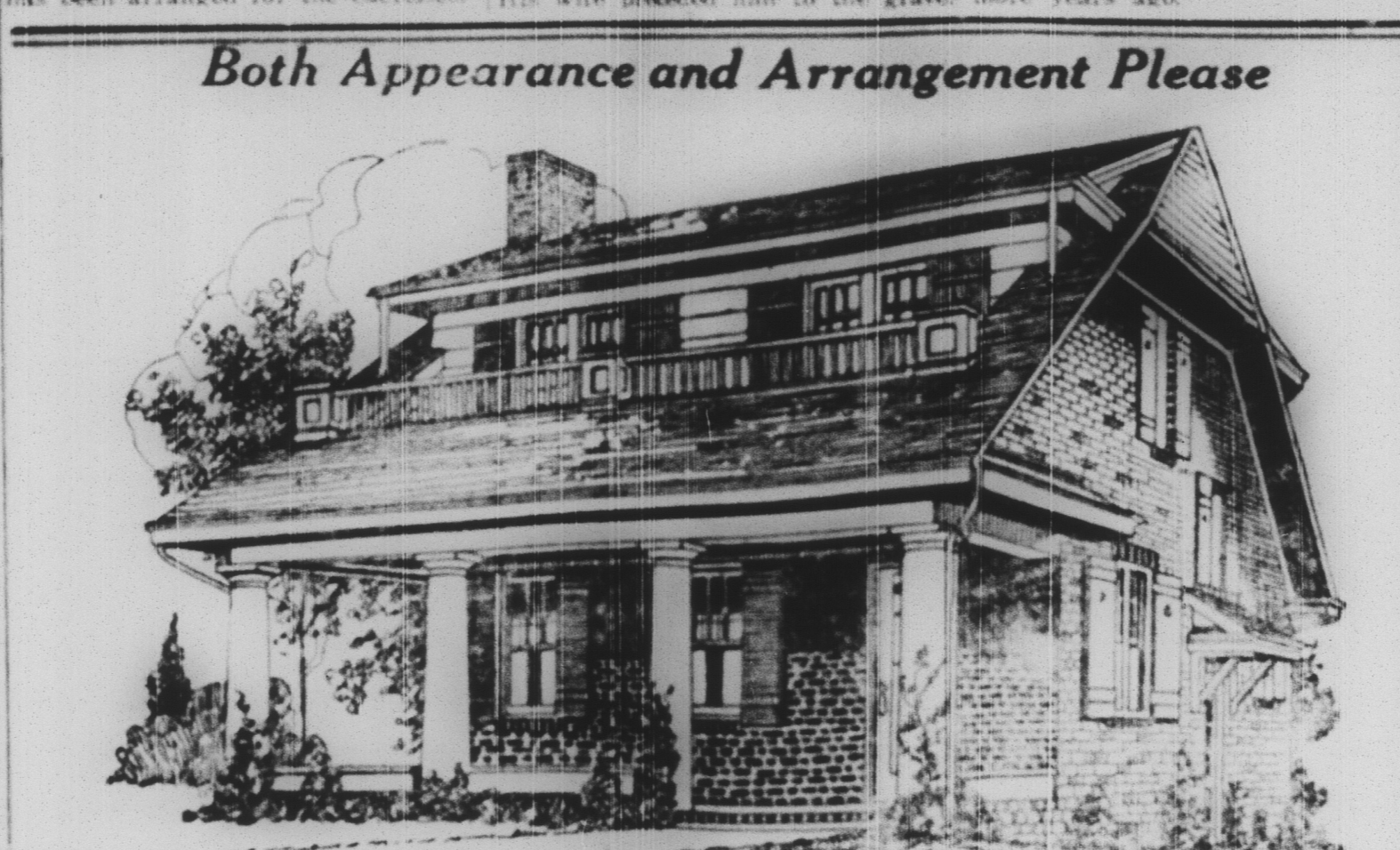

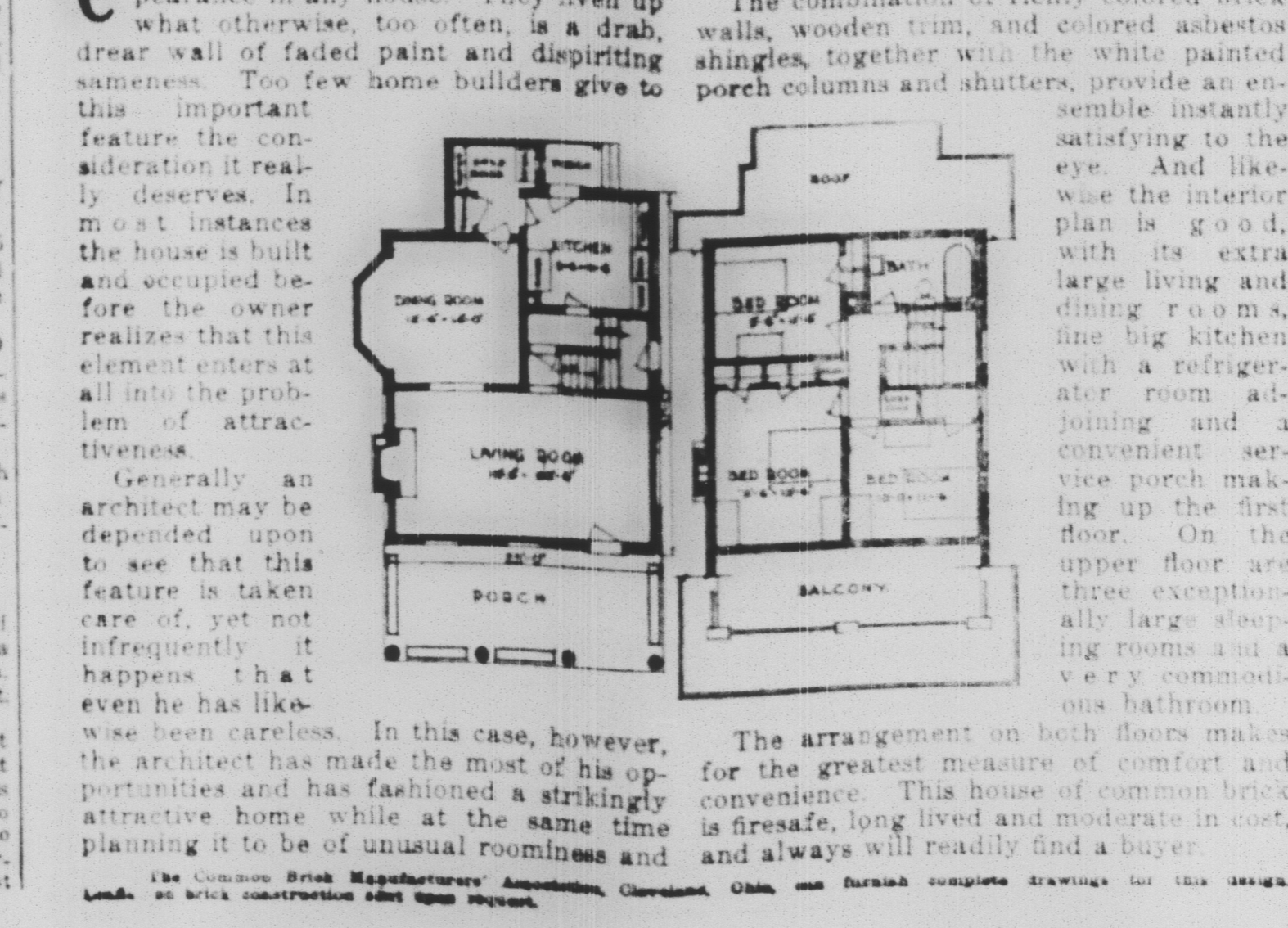
In this case, however, the architect has made the most of his opportunities and has fashioned a strikingly attractive home while at the same time planning it to be of unusual roominess and convenience.
