



INDORSE LEGISLATION TO BOOST JUDGES' PAY


Proposed legislation at this ate legislature to increase the sal of Judges and to reform existing to permit the holding of court a frequent intervals when the bust more frequent intervals when the bu ness of the county warrants it, were dorsed at a meeting of the Cambria Con by Bar Association held in the Co House at Ebensburg on Monday. The lawyers favored the passage of act that would raise indges' salaries an amount commensurate with their : erage income if in private practice of law. Salary raises were granted Jud law. Salary raises were granted Judg of the state by the last legislature, f the bill was vetoed by Governor Pinch The present salary of a Judge is \$10,0 and will lamount to \$13,000 if the increa

is granted. A proposed law that will be introduce early in the present session of the legis lature authorizing the Judges of the se-eral courts of the Commonwealth to fi the number of the regular terms by o der, establishing the time for holdin them and fixing the time for jury trial met with the approval of the Bar Ass cistion.

An important section that will be in corporated into the act will permit th corporated info the act will permit t judges to summon a grad jury prior the holding of a term of court as fix by rule of court and to hold over t grand jury for an additional week if is deemed necessary. The act would al provide as follows: "The Judges of the courts of Quart Sessions of Oyer and Terminer shall a so have power to hold over the gran jury summoned at any term during t interim and until the grand jury of t

pury summoned at any term during t interim and until the grand jury of t next succeeding term is assembled, a shall have full power, without the iss ing of a new venire, to call such gra-jury to assemble in session and disp-of any business properly laid before erand jury at any recular term " Under this section there would be a all times a grand jury subject to call he need of any important investigatio resented itself or an unusually larj umber of criminal cases accumulated b rand jury at any regular term veen terms.
