DENIED A NEW TRIAL.

The court in an opinion written by Judge S. Lenmon Reed refused a new trial in the case of John W. James of Barnesboro against Jacob F. Smith, proprietor of a Barnesboro moving picture house. The plaintiff sustained injuries while in the theatre to attend a show when he was directed by an usher to a certain room and when opening the door he fell into an arway. A jury awarded him \$1,000, and the defendant appealed, claiming that the usher had no authority from him and that he should not be liable for his employee's act. The court holds that the matter was a question for the jury and refuses to disturb the verdict.

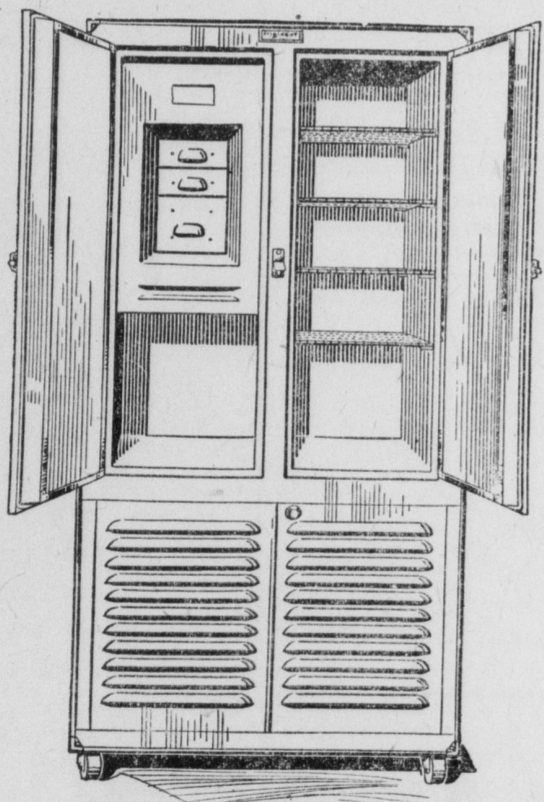
