

BARRACKS FOR EVICTED MINERS BUILT AT NANTY-GLO

Barracks which will accommodate three families were completed last week to help relieve the housing situation caused by several of the coal companies evicting the families of union miners at Nanty-Glo. William T. Welch, member of the executive board of district No. 2, U. M. W. of A., announces that two more large buildings to be constructed there have been contracted for and work will be commenced within a few days.

BULK OF MOTOR FINES NOW GO TO THE STATE

Disposition of fines for violation of the new State Motor Code, effective Jan. 1, next, were explained in an opinion on Friday by Secretary of Highways Stewart and Deputy Attorney General Koch.

The opinion holds that all fines from this source shall be paid to the state treasurer, except those collected for violations of the provisions as to speed or weight, which fines and penalties shall be paid to the treasurer of the municipality for the construction, repair and maintenance of the highways thereof.

Signal lights and semaphores, the opinion holds, however, are installed by the municipalities interested, and are maintained and operated at their expense, which in some cases, is not inconsiderable. It is, therefore, only fair that the municipalities should have the right to fines collected for violation of ordinances for the regulation of traffic by street lights, etc.

The opinion holds the legislature intended this latter interpretation and that retention of fines for violation of traffic light ordinances by a municipality would not constitute a conflict in the law ordering all fines except those specified to be paid into the state treasury.

The funeral took place on Saturday morning in St. James' Catholic church and interment was in the church cemetery.

STATE ADOPTS 18-FOOT ROAD BUILDING POLICY

A new policy of building roads of a minimum width of 18 feet has been adopted by the state highway department for the future. In the past the department has followed the system of building 18 foot roads on the primary system and 16 foot highways on the secondary.

Traffic is increasing to such an alarming extent that it is anticipated in the next ten years motor registrations in Pennsylvania will increase to over 2,500,000 vehicles. At present the registrations total slightly more than 1,540,000. A prediction of doubling and tripling of traffic on some roads is made.

FARM BUILDINGS BURN

Fire completely destroyed the house and barn owned by William Zayurske on his farm west of Carrolltown, between 5 and 6 o'clock last Friday morning. A few pieces of furniture and some chickens were the only things saved from the two buildings, it is said. The Zayurske family consists of the parents and eight children, but none was hurt in the burning that cost the home. Insurance was carried on the buildings that were burned.

CATTLE QUARANTINE IN BARR TOWNSHIP

The Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture has declared a general quarantine on cattle in Barr Township, this county, because of tuberculosis existing in cattle in that territory. C. G. Jordan, secretary of agriculture, has announced rules and regulations that will be effective in the enforcement of the quarantine as follows:

No cattle shall be imported or brought in, or allowed to enter the quarantine area, except in accordance with these rules:

Cattle for immediate slaughter may enter the restricted area to be slaughtered within ten days, and during the ten day period they must be kept separate from the other cattle.

Steers, range cattle and semi-range cattle of recognized beef type may enter the quarantined area for feeding and grazing purposes under special quarantine, but must be confined separate from other cattle on the premises of the owner, or on such other premises as may be designated in the quarantine.

Bul calves under six months old of recognized beef type may enter the quarantined area for feeding and grazing purposes under separate quarantine.

All other cattle other than those described must be subjected to an official tuberculin test before entering the quarantined area, and shall be kept separate from other cattle until they have passed a sixty to 90 day re-test.

CHANGES IN BAG LIMITS.

William F. Gordon, sportsman, of Barnesboro, has received several copies of the summaries and season bag limits of the new Game Code from the Board of Game Commissioners at Harrisburg. They differ from the Book of laws somewhat and a copy of the new code will be given with each 1928 license issued by the county treasurer. These changes have appeared in the papers several times. In a letter to Mr. Gordon the board of game commissioners in part, have the following to say: The bag limits differ from our book of laws for the reason that we have no right to change these seasons as made by our legislature. The board of game commissioners are given the power to change the seasons and bag limits from year to year and they will always conflict more or less. These changes have been advertised in most all of our papers several times. It is up to you as an officer of the board of game commissioners to impress upon all sportsmen that the summaries as sent you are the ones they are to follow.
