WOMAN IS KILLED AND FIVE INJURED

Mrs. John Barton, 45, wife of a prominent coal operator of Hopewell, Bedford county, was instantly killed Saturday afternoon and two of her children are in critical condition in the Altoona hospital, as a result of their automobile crashing into a telephone pole on a sharp turn near the Sheehan farm, Cresson. Frank Barton, aged 21, suffered a fracture of the skull at the base of the brain and is not expected to recover, and Miss Helen Barton, aged 16, suffered severe injuries of the chest and is in a serious condition at the Altoona hospital. Another daughter, aged 10 years, suffered a fracture of the frontal bone of the head, but was reported to be resting fairly well at the hospital to which they were taken in the ambulance.

Mr. Barton, driver of the machine and another son, aged 6, escaped with slight cuts and bruises. They also were treated at the Altoona hospital. Mr. Barton had purchased a new sedan a few weeks ago. The car was so badly damaged that it is believed it is beyond repair.

The Sheehan curve of Cresson is located about two miles west of Cresson and has been the scene of a number of serious accidents. It is that that Mr. Barton was traveling at a high rate of speed and was unable to round the curve, the crash following.

Later—Frank Barton, aged 21, died at the Altoona hospital Tuesday, as the result of injuries sustained.
