


Combining the Colonial and Old English



CHARACTER is becoming more and more an essential quality of the modern home and the plain, unadorned house of our grandfathers no longer carries its old-time appeal. Although the architect designs only a trifle more than one-third of today's houses, they leave their imprint upon a considerably larger percentage of them. Even though a contractor builds them from stock plans there is here and there the influence of the architect's artistry.

The box type house that was so prevalent a quarter of a century ago, relieved generally by frescoes and jig-sawed ornamentation, is rapidly passing out of the picture. Today the lines are more broken, there is a tendency to more gables, dormer windows appear in unexpected places and windows no longer are of any set pattern. Variety is demanded and has become the rule.

In this home, which is a departure from the ordinary Colonial type with center hall,



an English influence is apparent, adding a certain distinction with but little outlay above the ordinary cost of the more familiar design. And with the combination of half dormers the effect is altogether pleasing. It is really an unusual treatment.

Built of common brick laid in running bond, with brick sills, and roofed with a fire resistant shingle, it becomes a home on which maintenance expense will always be held to the minimum and its degree of fire safety be high. It is a sensible type of home for the man of moderate means.

Its six rooms and sleeping porch will accommodate comfortably the average family, as they are all of good size and well lighted. The bath is most conveniently placed. Large living and dining rooms are features with an exceptional master's bedroom. The floor plans tell the story fairly convincingly but to appreciate fully the unusual desirability of this house one must really see it.
