STUDY METHODS OF RAISING BOB WHITES Realizing that it is becoming increasingly difficult to secure game and game birds for stocking purposes, the State Game Commission is preparing to raise all species which formerly were bought from commercial sources. From data now being collected it is planned to extend the present ring-neck pheasant experiments to bobwhite quail. Virginia has been successful in the raising of the quail and the members of the commission recently spent several days on the game farms at Boulevard, near Richmond.

This is an era of big things. Business is conducted in a big and lavish way and so is politics, thanks to our modern printed system. The railroad, the automobile, the modern long distance telephone, the telegraph and the radio have made our present civilization possible.

This is not only the era of big business but of standardized business. Our present prosperity in part is due to the standardized methods now employed, together with mass production which makes possible. The tendency is toward combination, toward bigger and better things in the business world.

All of this, of course, is well and good and the work of the individual has given way to the standardized product, and this product has made possible the enjoyment by the working classes of luxuries undreamed of a few generations ago.

This modern habit of doing things in a big way has crept into the educational world, too. Our universities are getting bigger and bigger each year, and more and more in the news of the world. Students are attracted to them by the thousands.

But there is a word to be said for the small college, too. The standardized product in the purely business world has added to our comfort and our standard of living, but it is an open question whether a purely standardized product in the way of university and college graduates would add so much to our intellectual progress.
