**EBENSBURG COURT
HAS A BUSY WEEK**

(Continued from the First Page.)

Setting a probable record in Cambria
county for the trial of a homicide case
a jury in Judge Evans' court shortly
after 5:30 o'clock Monday evening re-
turned a verdict finding Horace Har-
ris, colored, of Franklin borough, guilty
of murder in the first degree and
setting the penalty for the crime at
imprisonment for life. Pending dis-
position of a motion for a new trial
the court has not yet formally pro-
nounced sentence.

Harris was accused of the fatal
shooting of his sweetheart, Helen Wat-
kins, also colored, and residing in
Franklin, on the evening of March
10th last. The shooting followed a
quarrel between the two and efforts on
the part of Harris for a reconciliation
were rebuffed by the girl. When his
second attempt of the evening to as-
sume former relations failed, Harris,
who admitted carrying a revolver all
that evening, shot the Watkins girl
four times. His only defense was that
he was under the influence of liquor at
the time and could not recall what had
happened.

A jury in the case was selected with-
in half an hour on Monday morning
and the taking of testimony, the argu-
ments of counsel and the charge of the
Court were completed shortly be-
fore five o'clock.

Pete Mihalovich, former proprietor of
a saloon in Johnstown, pleaded guilty
in court to possession of liquor and was
sentenced to pay the costs, a fine of
\$100 and to serve not less than three
months nor more than three years in
the county jail. This was the defend-
ant's second appearance before the
court on a liquor charge.

Sam Plutyk, former proprietor of a
hotel between Dunio and Llainfair,
which since his arrest has been de-
stroyed by fire, pleaded guilty to viola-
tion of the liquor laws and was sen-
tenced to pay the costs, a fine of \$100
and to serve not less than 3 months
nor more than three years in the
county jail.

Mrs. Pearl Divido and W. T. Evans
both residing near Nanty-Glo, were
found guilty before Judge McCann of
offenses against morality, and the for-
mer was sentenced to pay the costs
and to serve not less than three months
nor more than one year in the county
jail, and the later was ordered to pay
the costs and a fine of \$100. The court
expressed regret that under the indict-
ment drawn against him he was un-
able to give Evans a more severe sen-
tence.

In the case of William Calderwood of
Cresson, charged by John C. Karnes
also of Cresson, with aggravated assau-
lt and battery, a jury returned a ver-
dict of not guilty and ordered that the
costs be divided equally between the
defendant and prosecutor.

Peter Zigza, of Johnstown, was found
guilty of an offense against morality
and was given the usual sentence.

Lewis Felix of Johnstown, charged
with an offense against morality was
found not guilty but was ordered to
pay the costs.

Anna Maugko of Barnesboro, charged
with assault and battery on the pro-
secution of Mary Majoris, was con-
victed and ordered to pay the costs and
a fine of \$10.

Charles Hogan of Portage, was found
not guilty of aggravated assault and
battery, but was ordered to pay the
costs.

Leroy Livingston of Scalp Level was
found not guilty of assault and bat-
tery, but was ordered to pay half the
costs, and the prosecutrix, Grace Liv-
ingston the other half.

Ted Seese of Johnstown, was acquit-
ted on a charge of carrying concealed
weapons and the jury ordered the costs
be equally divided between the defend-

ant and Edna Wirick, the prosecutrix.
Clair Miles was acquitted of a charge
of assault and battery and the costs
were ordered divided equally between
he and the prosecutor.

A sentence of two years in the coun-
ty jail and the costs was given Pete
Mullen, of Johnstown, following con-
viction of keeping a bawdy house, and
sentence was suspended on Jesse Im-
ler of Johnstown convicted of assault
and battery.

Charles D. Myers was sentenced to
pay the costs and further sentence was
suspended after he pleaded guilty to
violation of the liquor laws. John San-
dor received a suspended sentence and
John Ballick was fined \$100 and costs
on pleas of guilty to liquor law viola-
tions.

On payment of costs sentence was
suspended on John Williams, who plea-
ded guilty to liquor law violations,
and a like penalty was fixed for John
Scott who also pleaded guilty to viola-
tion of the liquor law.

Sadie Scot was fined \$100 and costs
and Laura McNally received a suspen-
ded sentence after paying the costs.
Both women pleaded guilty to liquor
law violations. A verdict of not guilty
was returned in the case of Nick Ru-
by, charged with liquor violations.

Julia Showers was found guilty and
assessed the costs in the case, while
Fred Showers was acquitted of a li-
quor law violation charge.

A fine of \$100 and costs and a sen-
tence of one day to one year was pla-
ced on Tony Facci, convicted liquor
law violator; Sam Musulin received a
suspended sentence and Mike Houdish
was fined \$100 and costs an dsenten-
ced to serve one day to three years
in the county jail.
