Longer Than American Statistics show that English women live longer on the average than American women. English men and Ameri-

can men have about the same ex-pectation of life. Rollo Briten, statistician of the United States public health service. decreases gradually the older the person, is higher for English women than between ten and eighty years.

The difference between the two countries in this respect ranges from about four years in young womanhodd to less than one year at the age

This means that the Englishwoman of twenty may expect to live to be sixty-nine, while her American sister may expect to reach the age of only sixty-four or sixty-five.

No attempt is made by the public health service to explain why this difference in longevity exists between the female population and not between the males.


