CENTRAL PENNSA. OPERATORS DECLINE MINERS' OVERTURE

An invitation tendered August 17th, by James Mark, president of district No. 2, U. M. W. of A., to the association of Bituminous Coal Operators of Central Pennsylvania to participate in a joint conference to discuss wage mat-

ters, was declined on Monday night by the association. The answer to the union as announced at Altoona by Chas. O'Neill, president of the operators' association, said:

"The Association of Bituminous Coal Operators of Central Pennsylvania respectfully declines your offer to meet with the United Mine Workers, district No. 2, in joint conference."

The miners' invitation extended to the operators, who have been working under the Jacksonville scale, the option of returning to the so-called Philadelphia scale until a conference could be arranged for the adoption of a new scale. Adoption of the Philadelphia scale would have brought a reduction of approximately 20 per cent.

PORTAGE MINER FATALLY INJURED; IS HIT BY AUTO

Run down by George Palusko, about 8 o'clock on Wednesday night of last week, while walking along a highway near Portage, Steve Chissel, aged 30 years, residing one mile southeast of Portage, was fatally injured, expiring two hours later at a physician's hospital in Portage. Death was caused by a fracture of the skull and internal injuries. The victim's face was also badly cut. The driver of the machine did not stop, but was arrested in South Fork a few days later, and taken to jail, in connection with the accident.

Two girls were riding in the car with Palusko at the time of the fatality and both testified against him at a preliminary hearing. The girls told the authorities that after Palusko had struck Chissel they appealed to him to stop the machine and render assistance to the injured man, but he refused. Palusko, the girls said, also refused to stop the automobile to permit them to get out.

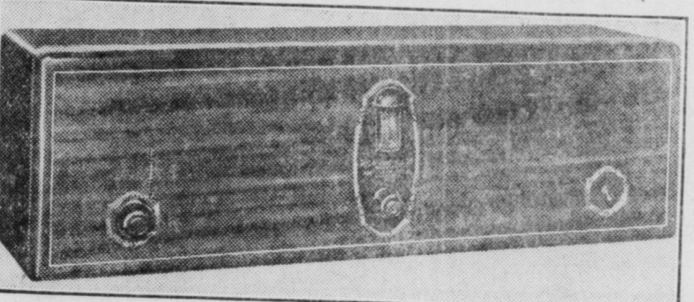

NEW SOCKET-POWER RECEIVERS MEET WITH FAVORABLE RESPONSE



The new socket-power receivers are fast replacing the old type set. The simple form of turning on the light switch now supplies an inexhaustible source of uniform power.

One of the new and improved socket-power receivers recently announced is the Radiola No. 18. In speaking of it, Mr. J. L. Ray of the Radio Corporation of America said, "It is entirely self-contained and extremely compact, requires no batteries or external radio power units, but plugs directly into the nearest A-C electric light socket or outlet. With simplified precision tuning, substantial volume and realism of tone, and finely balanced sensitivity and selectivity, this new receiver has all the basic features to make it an outstanding success."

"In addition, laboratory technicians have further improved selectivity so that sharper tuning is provided with

the new receiver. An improved form of tuned radio-frequency circuit is employed, comprising three stages of radio-frequency amplification, detector, and two stages of audio-frequency amplification.

"The operation has been reduced to the simplest form. A power switch turns the set on and off. The line is no greater than for the usual 50-watt lamp. Tuning is accomplished entirely by one knob, while an indicator dial moves past a window in the panel. The volume intensity is controlled by a simple, volume control to meet the specific tastes of the listener.
