VOTERS APPROVED ONLY FOUR OF AMENDMENTS

Official returns in the vote cast in the November election on the fourteen proposed amendments to the Constitution have now been received by the state bureau of elections from all of the state's 67 counties with the exception of Philadelphia.

The official returns added to the unofficial returns from Philadelphia show that the only amendments approved were Numbers 6, 12, 13 and 14.

Numbers 6 and 13 pave the way for optional installation of voting machines and Number 12 permits inheritance tax exemptions to residents of other states which have reciprocal legislation. Number 14 permits consolidation of Allegheny county into a metropolitan district.

Amendment No. 5, To permit legislative exemption of inheritance: Yes, 429,273; No, 652,268.
Amendment Number 6, to permit changes in election districts where voting machines are to be used: Yes, 536,440; No, 439,340.

Amendment No. 7, to permit Pittsburgh to assess abutting property: Yes, 377,611; No, 508,230.

Amendment No. 8, to increase bonded indebtedness limit of second class cities: Yes, 414,326; No, 484,085.

Amendment No. 9, \$50,000,000 bond issue for highways: Yes, 453,341; No, 622,925.

Amendment No. 10, \$50,000,000 bond issue for welfare: Yes, 439,180; No, 522,708.

Amendment No. 11, to increase Philadelphia debt limit: Yes, 372,450; No, 481,859.

Amendment Number 12, to permit reciprocal inheritance tax legislation: Yes, 480,614; No, 402,381.

Amendment No. 13, to permit optional installation of voting machines: Yes, 734,670; No, 345,441.

Amendment Number 14, to permit consolidation of Allegheny county into a greater Pittsburgh: Yes, 464,602; No, 430,800.

The figures show that the State College Bond Issue was the only one of the five totalling \$138,000,000 to come near approval.

With all of the official returns in except Philadelphia, this issue led by 1-400, but Philadelphia's vote sent it to defeat.

SKELTON OF INDIAN BEING PREPARED FOR A MUSEUM

Attaches of the state museum are carefully mounting the bones of a recently unearthed Indian skeleton, and historians are trying to piece together the significant details of his life. The Indian skeletons in good state of preservation are rare in this region and unusual care is being used in handling it.

Experts estimate that the skeleton is that of a Shawnee warrior buried more than 200 years ago. He started on the trail to the Happy Hunting Ground with his dog by his side, for a canine skull was unearthed nearby.

The Warrior's long rest was disturbed by a steam shovel excavating for a filling station. The state museum was notified, and Dr. Frederic A. Godcharles, the director, hurried to the spot and assisted in securing the skeleton.

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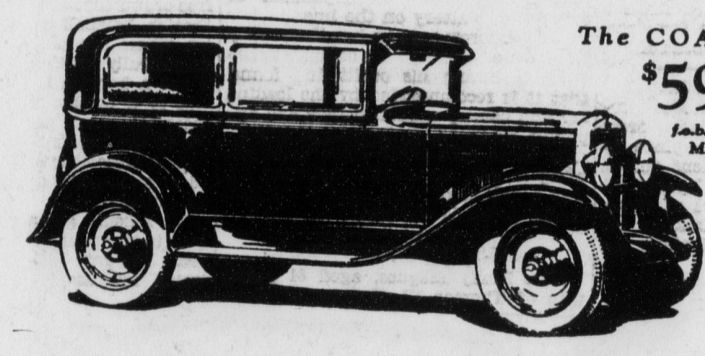
