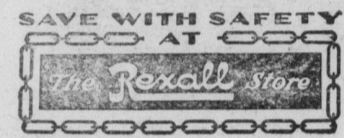

RECENT DEATHS IN THE COUNTY Folks in the Neighboring Communities Who Have Crossed the Great Divide.

Mrs. Catherine Yahner, aged seventy years died at her home in Summerhill on Thursday evening last. She was the widow of P. O. Yahner. These children survive: Thomas P., of Chicago, Ill.; William J., of Summerhill; Sister M. Barbara, of the Order of St. Benedict, Pittsburgh; Sister M. Hyacinth of the Order of O. S. S., of London, England; and Helen, of Chicago. Mrs. Yahner was a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Plummer. She is also survived by three sisters and two brothers. The funeral services were held on Sunday afternoon in St. John's church at Summerhill and interment was in St. Bartholomew's cemetery at Wilmore.

Mrs. Mary E. Eckenrode, nee Mary Ellen Trinkle, who had been ill at her home in Loretto for the past year of a complication of diseases, died on Thursday last in the 74th year of her age. She was born in Carrolltown on October 7th, 1854, a daughter of the late George and Magdalene (Keefe) Trinkle. Mrs. Eckenrode lived her entire life in Cambria county, and had resided in Loretto for the past thirty years.

EIGHT PLEADERS IN EBENSBURG COURT All three of the county judges presided over the regular weekly session of motion and petition court at Ebensburg on Monday. In addition to the hearing of motions and petitions arguments were heard in several cases.

The following persons appeared before the court, waived the finding of true bills, and entered pleas of guilty to the offenses to which they were charged: Elmer Hopkins, of Blandburg, charged with escape, was sentenced to pay the costs, and further sentence suspended. He escaped from the Ashville lock-up some time ago and was later apprehended.

James Bartelbaugh of Ebensburg, charged with burglary, was sentenced to pay the costs and sent to the Huntingdon Reformatory. The defendant on the night of January 3rd was discovered in the residence of David A. Jones, in the East Ward of Ebensburg, where he stole a pocket book containing \$7.

James Williams, of Blandburg, charged with malicious mischief, was sentenced to pay the costs, make restitution and to serve not less than three months nor more than one year in the county jail. The defendant broke a window in a residence in Blandburg while he was intoxicated.

George Polochik and William Wise, both of St. Michael, the former charged with larceny and the latter with assault, were both remanded to the county jail for further investigation of their cases.

Funeral services for John D. Ager, aged 85 years, a well known retired farmer, who died on Saturday at Nicktown, were held at nine o'clock Tuesday morning at St. Nicholas Catholic church, Nicktown, and interment was in St. Benedict's cemetery at Carrolltown.

Mrs. Ager was born in Carroll township on February 6, 1843. He was the eldest son of Thomas and Catherine Ager. He suffered for many years of asthma. He is survived by his widow, Margaret (Hoppel) Ager, and two brothers and three sisters: Henry Ager and Edward Ager of Spangler; Mrs. Theresa Hoppel, Carrolltown; and Mrs. Catherine Krug and Mrs. Emma Luther of New Kensington.

He had eleven children, two of whom preceded him to the grave. Mrs. Ida Brickley, who died on Saturday at Nicktown, was the widow of Frank Ager, of Carrolltown; Harry Ager, Bart Ager, Herman Ager, and Mrs. Amelia Kirsch, wife of A. S. Kirsch, all of Barr township; Mrs. Laura Lehman of Clearfield; William J. Ager, of Phillipsburg; and Mrs. Adelaide Mulvehill, of Johnstown. Mr. Ager was a prominent farmer of Barr township for a number of years. He held the offices of assessor, school director and road supervisor successively for many years. Thirteen years ago he gave up farming and moved to Nicktown.

John Elder, aged 63, of South Fork, died at his home at eight o'clock Saturday night. Death was caused by influenza. The funeral services were held at 1:30 o'clock on Tuesday afternoon at the late residence and interment was in the South Fork cemetery. He is survived by his widow and several children.

Mrs. Mary J. Cole, aged 63 years, wife of Andrew J. Cole, died at her home in Bakerton at one o'clock on Monday morning. Death was caused by pneumonia.

The deceased is survived by her husband and one daughter, Mrs. Albert Mitchell, of Bakerton, also by three grandchildren. The funeral services were held at 9 o'clock on Wednesday morning in the Sacred Heart Church at Bakerton and interment was in the church cemetery.

Mrs. Edna I. Rodkey, aged 32 years, formerly of Westover, died on Saturday afternoon at her home in Altoona. Death was caused by influenza pneumonia. She had been ill three days. The body was removed to the home of her father, John Westover, of
