MANY ATTRACTIONS AT THE CAMBRIA COUNTY FAIR

Senator J. O. Clark, who owns the 3,000 acre game preserve, Jos-Win, on the northern edge of Cambria County, has taken such an interest in the showing of coon hounds at the Cambria County Industrial position and also in the field trials to be held on the Fourth of July for coon dogs, that he has consented to have some of the coons from his famous reserve, caught and brought to Ebensburg that may be used on the popular holiday for setting the trial for the dog trials. William D. Owens, of Ebensburg, a famous coon hunter, has been selected to go to the reserve and, with several of the Senator's game keepers, get the wild rascals which will be used at the Exposition. The animals will not be in the hands of the reserve until the woods again when they have served the purpose.

This action of Senator Clark only serves to show the keen interest that is taken, not only in Cambria County but in all of the western end of Pennsylvania and in adjoining states, in the yearly Exposition at Ebensburg.

It has been surprise to President Blair C. Seeds and also to Secretary H. Frank Dorr, that there has been such a hearty response from widely scattered points to the requests for entries in the field trial, the horse shoe pitching tournament, and the coal loading contest. While it is generally believed that golf is the really aristocratic sport yet bankers, clergymen, attorneys, industrialists and even a team from the poor farm have sent in applications for entrance blanks in the horse shoe pitching, which is sometimes styled "baryard golf".

Charles M. Schwab is arranging to furnish a magnificent trophy which will be awarded to the best dog in the bench show which takes place July 3 and 4 and which, undoubtedly, this year, will be the best display of all breeds of dogs that ever been made in this part of the state. Several of the dogs, already tentatively entered, and practically priceless as their owners would not part with them.

MAKE FEW CHANGES IN FISHING LAWS

Governor John S. Fisher has approved the only bill passed by the recent session of the Legislature which will affect the fishing laws of the Commonwealth.

Members of the Board of Game Commissioners considered the amendment which will permit them to make agreements for compensation. Where fishways are impracticable as one of the most important provisions of the measure.

The Board believes this amendment will mean much to the fishermen because there is no practical fishway in existence applicable to Pennsylvania waters and by having this agreement it will be possible to purchase fish each year for stocking of the dam. The money will be contributed by the corporation or person erecting the dam. An agreement already has been made with the owners of Conowingo Dam, whereby they are paying Pennsylvania \$4000 each year. The first payment has been made and an agreement will be entered into whereby this will be perpetual. Both Pennsylvania and Maryland will receive \$4000 each year.

Other Amendments

Other amendments to the fish laws will not affect the average fisherman as practically all the sizes, seasons, and numbers were left the same as previously. The only exception to this is that the section in reference to the muscal-longe and western pike was changed to include northern pike, and the size limit reduced from 28 to 22 inches. Practically the only section of the Commonwealth where this will affect the fisherman is in northwestern Pennsylvania where quite a number of these species are to be found, especially in Canadock Lake.

The following changes were also made by approval of the bill.

- Increase in shad seine license to \$10, which will now only be issued upon the commercial propagation of all species of fish with the exception of trout and bass, the fee remains the same, at \$25.00.
- Law amended so that the dealer in bait fish can have them in his possession until disposed of.
- Commissions for special fish wardens to expire on December 31 instead of May 31.
