Preliminary Feature at the Ebensburg Race Track on Thursday.

SOME FAST AUTO RACING.

A Model T Ford auto-pig race is to be the preliminary feature at the Cambria County race track at Ebensburg, on Memorial day, when the 100 mile dirt track feature race will be run. The preliminary will start at 2:30 o'clock Eastern Standard time and the big grind, half an hour later. For the pig race a crate of young porkers will be set at the starting line and, when the pistol fires, the racers will have to get out of their cars, grab a suckling pig, carry him under one arm, crank up, start and keep the pig in the car until they make a round of the track, depositing their piglet in the crate at the finish. The first man with his pig will get \$15.00 and the second \$10.00.
