DR. APPEL WARNS AGAINST OF BLASTING CAP EVIL

"One naturally associates the Fourtn of July with possible accidents due to explosives. And quite properly so. Toy annon, high powered fire crackers nd so-called toy pistols, annually take l large toll in the careless celebration of that national holiday. But the vaation period presents another hazar of this type to the child which is apparantly unappreciated by many adalts and parents. It has to do with lasting caps," said Dr. Theodore B ppel, secretary of health, this week.
"Hundreds of children are crippled ach year in the United States by playing with these caps. They pick hem up in the vicinity of mines ,quars or in the fields where agricultura

asting has been done.
"The result is that Pennsylvania" are of casualties of this sort cause ore or less fixed number of its young ed faces, arms and legs, if indeed they are sufficiently fortunate to escape de the isteries. And the pathetic feature of the situation lies in the easy avoidability of such accidents.

"Children should be warned by the arents never to tamper with such aps. They are highly sensative and use a violent explosion. The usual ethods by which young people sus-in injury from blasting caps are by riking them with a hammer attempt g to extract their contents with holding a lighted match to then by thrusting them into a fire.
