UNWARY MOTORISTS PAY \$2,516,625.36 IN TRAFFIC FINES

From Jan. 1, 1923, to Sept. 1, 1929, the Bureau of Motor Vehicles collected \$2,516,625.36 in fines for violations of the Motor Code. It is estimated that the sum represents fines paid by approximately one-half million operators of motor cars.
During the first eight months of 1929, the Bureau of Motor Vehicles received a total of \$395,344.29. This is an increase of 21 pct. over the same period in 1928.

* WEEKLY HEALTH TALK *
* The majority of Pennsylvania citizens have had their two weeks' outing and are back home once more. It must be admitted that in this annual outpouring of tired men, women and children much physical and mental good results. But, on the other hand, there are many who return from their vacation with their energy quite burned up and with their minds and bodies consequently in anything but first class shape, "said Dr. Theodore B. Appel, Secretary of Health, Tuesday.
"Be that as it may, for the majority of those who made the best, as well as of those who made the worst, of their outing, the idea seems to exist that once back in the old groove, nothing can be done to build up vigor and vitality until another fifty weeks have elapsed. Thus resigned to an illogical hopelessness many persons develop an indifferent physical attitude—and let it go at that. Which, however, is decidedly wrong.
"The cool, crisp, vitalizing days of autumn are just around the corner. And while one may not be able to walk along the seashore or in the deep northern woods until next summer, there certainly is no law against using the zesty atmosphere outside the home or office.
"As a matter of fact, nature likes to be treated with consistency and conversely, dislikes being forced. In short, vacation possibilities from a physical welfare standpoint are actually greater in the establishment of the daily habit of a peppy one or two mile walk, in reasonable eating, in the minimization of artificial stimulants, and in adequate sleep than they are in the crowded and exciting fourteen days of pleasure which only too frequently build one's body tone in theory only.

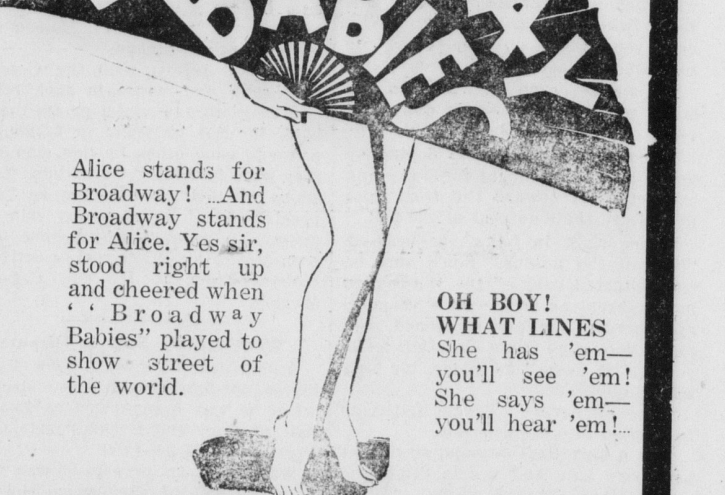
