EX GOVERNOR TO SPEAK AT MEETING

Martin G. Brumbaugh to Address Annual County Institute Oct. 21-25

The 62nd annual institute of the teachers of Cambria county will be held in the court house, Ebensburg, Oct. 21-25 inclusive, according to an announcement made recently by M. S. Bentz, county superintendent of schools.

The list of lecturers and instructors includes: Martin G. Brumbaugh, former governor and now president of Juniata college; Dr. F. W. Wright, deputy state superintendent of instruction of Massachusetts; Miss I. Jewell Simpson, assistant state superintendent of education of Maryland; Dr. Samuel H. Williams, University of Pittsburgh; Dr. E. D. Davis, New York; C. Valentine, department of public instruction, Harrisburg; Miss Olive S. Tilton, G. Hille, John W. Neff and Erna Grassmuck, of Pennsylvania State Teachers' college Indiana.

All the public schools in the county will be closed during institute week as prescribed by law. Teachers will pay a fee of \$4.50 each, the money to be used to pay the instructors at the institute, the cost of the Pennsylvania School Journal, the Annual, a song book, enrollment in the State Teachers' association and a contribution to defray the expenses of the delegates to the state meeting. Teachers will receive \$4 a day for attendance at the sessions of the institute.

Teachers may obtain board and room at various homes in Ebensburg as well as at the hotels.

The enrollment committee is composed of Asst. Supts. G. W. Stephens, Sarah Jones, Clara Shryock and D. K. Chestnut, W. C. Weyant, Clyde Stone and Joseph Plummer. This committee will be on duty in court room No. 1 from 8 until 12 o'clock the morning of Oct. 21.

MARTIN LINK IS TAKEN BY DEATH

Well Known Patton Resident, 77 Years of Age, Expired on Wednesday.

Martin Link, a well known Patton resident, aged 77 years, passed away at his home here at 9:30 o'clock Wednesday morning, of a complication of ailments due to his advanced age. He has resided in Patton for the past 20 years, and prior to that time was engaged in farming in Clearfield township. Mr. Link was born in Carrolltown in 1852, a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. John Link. His wife Mrs. Ellen Link, passed away about thirty years ago.

Deceased is survived by the following children: Patrick and John Link of St. Augustine; Alice, wife of William Gabriel of Ebensburg; James and Raymond Link of Clearfield township; Charles Link of Patton and Daniel and Mary Link at home. Three other children in the family are dead. Two brothers also survive: Sam Henry Link of Patton, and Simon Link of Hollidaysburg.

The funeral services will be held at nine o'clock on Saturday morning with a high mass of requiem in St. Mary's Catholic church, following which the casket will go to St. Augustine where interment will be made.

SERGT. COMSTOCK DIES WHILE IN ARMY SERVICE
Sergt. Charles J. Comstock, aged 24 years, son of Mrs. Kathryn Comstock of Cresson, died Saturday Sept. 21, in San Francisco, Cal., where he was stationed as an army aviator. Born in Altoona Oct. 24, 1905, the young man enlisted in the army at the age of 15. He served nine years in the regular army and last year was chosen to take up aviation. Last month Sergt. Comstock completed his flying course at Riverside. He was the only child of Mrs. Comstock, who is in charge of the linen rooms at the Cresson sanatorium.

The body arrived at Cresson Sunday morning and is at the H. F. Condit mortuary in this county. A military funeral took place at 9 o'clock Monday morning from St. Aloysius' Catholic church at the Summit, the requiem mass to be celebrated by the Rev. Father F. A. Magee, pastor. Interment was in the church cemetery.

SUMMIT MERCHANT DIES AFTER ILLNESS OF YEAR
Donald Sola Rao, aged 76, who conducted a store and garage on the William Penn highway at the Summit, died at 10 o'clock at the home of his son, Samuel Rao of the Summit, following a year's illness. He was born in Palermo, Italy, July 4, 1853, and was a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. John Rao.

At one time Mr. Rao held the position in Palermo corresponding to that of a merchant in this country. His wife, Genevieve Ruco Rao, died 25 years ago in Palermo. VOTERS TO PASS ON TWO MATTERS

Must Decide at Election on Increase of Indebtedness by \$365,000

A definite step toward the enlargement and improvement of the Cambria County Almshouse, and the construction of a new city-county hospital in Johnstown, was taken by the board of county commissioners in session at Ebensburg on Monday. Whether the indebtedness of the county shall be increased by the sum of \$365,000 to take care of the two projects will be put up to the voters of the county, the commissioners having authorized that the question be placed on the ballots to be used for the general election in November.

It is estimated that the enlargement of the Almshouse, equipping and furnishing it, and other necessary remodeling and renovation will cost \$275,000. Some time ago the board of county commissioners went on record as favoring the erection of a county-city hospital in Johnstown for taking care of infectious and contagious diseases, the county to assume 90 per cent of the cost of the proposed institution, but the total cost not to exceed \$90,000.

A new unit of the Cambria County Almshouse has been recognized as a dire necessity for a long time and has been recommended by several grand juries. Steps have been taken by the Cambria county poor directors to remedy this crowded condition, an architect has been engaged and several plans have been submitted, but no definite plan has yet been accepted.

ALTOONA MAN PAYS FINE AT EBENBURG
Wesley Wise of Altoona a truck driver for the firm of Rafferty Bros., of Altoona, was arrested at Ebensburg Thursday afternoon by State Motor Patrolman Ray Hoover and taken before Justice of the Peace James T. Young to answer a charge of driving an overloaded truck. Upon checking up the load on the motor truck it was ascertained that it was overweight, to the extent of 2,205 pounds over the 13,000 pounds and 10 per cent additional weight allowed for this type of vehicle. The driver of the truck was assessed a fine of \$50 and costs and was to transfer some of the contents of the truck to another truck in order to bring the weight of the load within the requirements of the law.

Upon check up of another truck it was found to be within the 10 per cent. overweight limit and the driver of the machine was directed to lighten the load to meet the requirements of the law, after which he was permitted to resume his trip.

PREPARE TO MAIL TAG APPLICATIONS
The Bureau of Motor Vehicles October 1 will begin mailing application for 1930 automobile license plates. For the last three weeks a special force of operatives has been "stuffing" applications into envelopes and "working" hundreds of thousands of pieces of mail so as to expedite passage through the mails. Under a ruling from Post-office headquarters, Washington, Bureau headquarters must see to it that applications for town or city are "bunched" before going to the post-office. The Bureau's force is being aided by retired railway mail clerks whose knowledge is of great benefit. As is well known, 1930 license plates may be used December 15.

VOTING MACHINE TO BE BALLOTTED

Placing in Every Precinct will Be Decided at November Election

The voters of Cambria county will be given an opportunity at the general election in November to determine whether voting machines shall be installed in every precinct, a total of 167 in the county.

The board of county commissioners in session at Ebensburg on Monday passed a resolution to have the question placed on the ballot, the vote to be taken on the issue as a whole and not as regards separate precincts.

According to an act of the last legislature, County Commissioners were given the option of having the voting machine proposition voted upon as a whole or by precinct, and the Cambria County Commissioners decided upon the former plan. If a count of the ballots should show that the vote was favorable, a voting machine will be placed in every election precinct in the county.

For the education and information of the many voters of Cambria county so that they may vote intelligently, the county commissioners have arranged to place on exhibition at various vantage points throughout the county sample voting machines, which will be in charge of competent operators, who will explain the machine in detail and show the voters how to operate it. This will be done before the election in November.

As a result of injuries received one week ago when caught under a fall of rock while working in Barnes Mine No. 12, Emory Wallace, aged 41 years, of Barnesboro died Wednesday last week at Miners' Hospital Spangler. The victim's chest was badly crushed in the accident.

Bucky Mazur aged 7 months, son of Anthony and Pauline Mazur, died of whooping cough Wednesday evening of last week at the parental home in Cresson. Funeral services were conducted at 2 o'clock Friday afternoon.

Michael Abbruzzese, aged 35, is confined to his home in Cresson, suffering from the probable fractures of two ribs and other injuries, which he sustained last Thursday when he fell from a railroad car at the Calandra Bros. junk yard at Cresson. Barnesboro is assured of a shirt-manufacturing plant, the citizens having subscribed for their quota of \$60,000 of stock in the concern. A number of chickens perished in the blaze, while some were saved. The loss is estimated at about \$750. The Cresson Fire Company was called to fight the blaze, but the firemen were handicapped because of lack of water.

Fire of undetermined origin about 4 o'clock Thursday morning destroyed a double frame dwelling and badly damaged two other double dwellings in South Fork, they were owned by the South Fork Coal Mining Company. The loss amounted to several thousand dollars.

BUREAU OF MOTOR VEHICLES
The Bureau of Motor Vehicles during the past week revoked the cards of sixty-two automobile drivers and made suspensions, pending investigation, in fifty-eight other cases.

EARLY INSPECTION
Benjamin G. Eynon, Commissioner of Motor Vehicles, advises owners of Pennsylvania cars and trucks to have their machines inspected as soon as practicable after September 30. "In the compulsory inspection period beginning October 1 and ending November 15, approximately 1,000,000 motor vehicles must be inspected by less than 5000 mechanics and shops," said Commissioner Eynon. "Estimating that there are 37 working days in the period mentioned, each of the 5000 shops must inspect approximately 11 machines daily, in order to reach them all.
