ORDINANCE NO. 173  
An ordinance of the Borough of Patton fixing the side walk grade on the west side of Fifth avenue, between Beech and MaGee avenues to conform to the curb grade of the street.

Be it enacted and ordained by the Burgess and Town Council of the Borough of Patton, and it is hereby enacted by authority of the same. That the side walk grade on the West side of Fifth avenue, between Beech and MaGee avenues in the Borough of Patton is hereby changed from its present grade to conform to the grade of the curb of said street, with such elevation from the street curb to the lot line of the property owners as the Borough Engineer shall establish. That the actual work of lowering the grade of said side walk shall all be done at once time by the property owners, so as least inconvenience the traveling public, and shall be done without cost and expense to the borough of Patton.

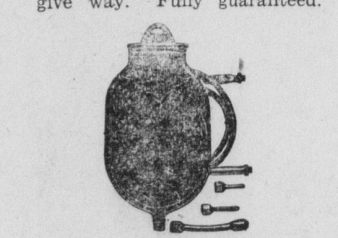

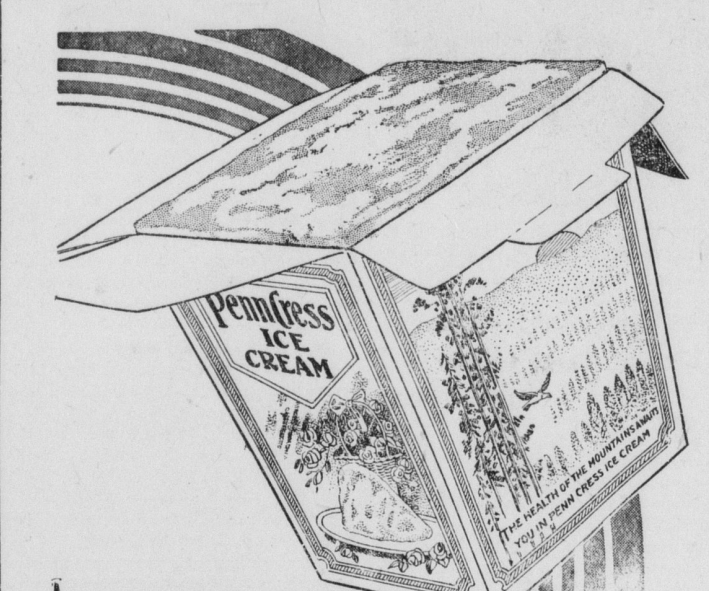
