Weekly Health Letter of State

A few days ago the nation for the eleventh time celebrated Armistice Day. Reports indicate that the main subject discussed at that time involved peace. Nationally and internationally, the spirit of settling disputes with governments through arbitration rather than by the sword, is constantly gaining in general popularity and favor. Statesmen and people appear to be developing peace-mindedness, with war and resort to arms losing much of its popular glamour in the process," said Dr. Theodore B. Appel, Secretary of Health recently.

"It indeed would be a happy condition if individuals would also generate a peaceful spirit against the enemies of health that are represented by unwise living habits now so prevalent. Belching cannon, rasping machine guns and chemical attacks are spectacular and stark realities, as every veteran knows. But unfortunately, habits which undermine health and often destroy life do not present the ugly and terrifying aspects as do the instruments of battle.

"The overloaded table, habitually 'attacked' by the overeating hordes, has all the ear-marks of a friend. Nevertheless, it represents one of the effective methods of developing disease and prematurely terminating the lives of many of its victims.

"Excessive and habitual use of stimulants to prod an already tired body on its way also is one of mankind's most formidable enemies. Easy and painless to take 'tis true, but powerful to kill just the same.

"Again, a deep-cushioned chair regularly and exclusively employed as a substitute for daily exercise and fresh air literally welcomes one with open arms—and then having succumbed to its wiles it frequently makes 'casualties' of those whose affection for it has been too sincere.

"It must be appreciated that life itself is a war—a daily battle against germ-life and the devitalizing influence of today's mode of existence. When the individual seriously realizes this fact, and then follows it up with the removal of those enervating influences that are bent on wounding or killing him, the spirit of peace will indeed have taken proper hold and a real Armistice will have been signed.

"Do not forget that preparedness in the form of a healthy and vital con-

stitution is as essential to the man or woman as is preparedness in terms of armies and battleships to nations. Therefore, sign the Armistice today with your bad habits. Thus gain and keep strength and exemplify peace in its most personal, happy and sensible way. Proclaim a real victory. And live many years to celebrate it."

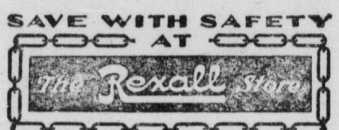

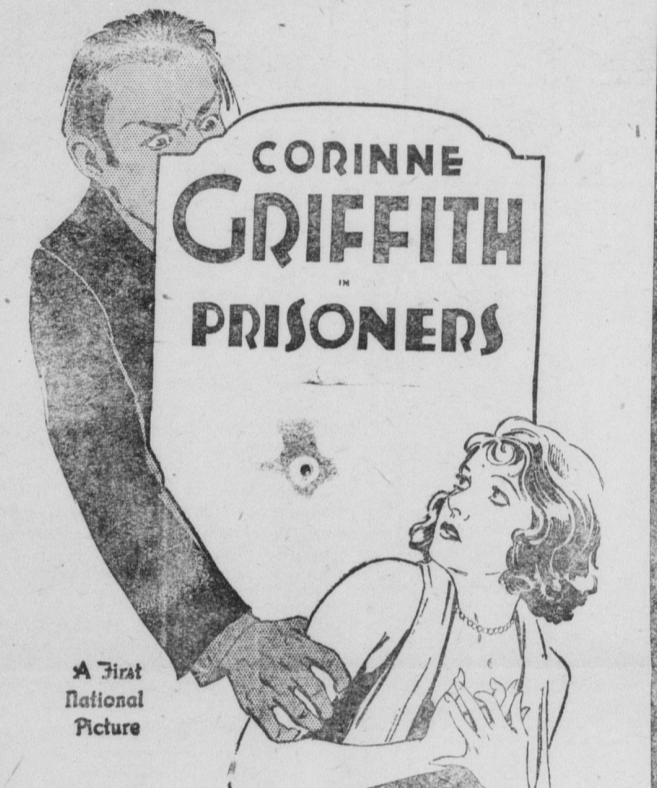
