St. Francis Man Condemns Reds

Launching preparations for the annual oratorical contest, Prof. Anthony J. Frayne, head of the language department at St. Francis College, recently flayed the Communists in this country in his address to the members of the Schultz Oratorical Society at Loreto last week.

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"Too many of our citizens view with complacency the daring activities of these propagandists. Too many are entirely ignorant of the operations of these agitators who would gleefully tear down that Cathedral of Independence that is a monument to the labor and integrity of the founders of our country, and a shrine which we as Americans must reverence. The Reds 'Liberty' under the Law."

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Continuing his discourse, Mr. Frayne cited from press files a number of accounts of recent outbreaks in all sections of the country. "Today these advocates of revolution, taking advantage of that Constitutionally guaranteed freedom which they would destroy, are staging demonstrations throughout the broad expanse of our country. What irreparable damage they did, will all be incontrovertible evidence in the hands of those who contend that we who point with alarm at these conditions are extremists."

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As required by State law, all four school district heads in this county who hold the title of Superintendent will be up for re-election for terms of four years on Tuesday, April 8.

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The election of the County Superintendent will take place at a special meeting at the Courthouse in Ebsenburg at 10:30 o'clock on the morning of April 8. All School Directors of Cambria County, whose districts come under the County Superintendent's jurisdiction, will be eligible to vote present at the meeting.

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Mrs. Mary Smith, aged 69 years, widow of John Smith, died Wednesday of last week at the home of her daughter, Mrs. John Ambrisko, of Carrolltown. She had been in poor health for several months, but her death was unexpected. The deceased was born in Austria-Hungary December 10, 1860, and had been a resident of Carrolltown for the last 20 years.

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The body of Miss Elizabeth Seymore who would have been 81 years of age had she lived just two weeks longer, was brought from Cleveland, O., Friday night to the vicinity of her birthplace. She died suddenly Wednesday of last week in Cleveland, where since last November she had been making her home with her niece Mrs. Mary Dishart, also formerly of Carrolltown. Death was due to a complication of diseases incident to her advanced age.

TINY TIM CLUB DRIVE STARTED

Annual Drive for Benefit of Crippled Children Opened by Kiwanians.

The fourth annual drive for funds in the Tiny Tim Club, a movement fostered by the Kiwanis Club of Northern Cambria county, for the expenses in correcting the defects of crippled children of Northern Cambria county, in the orthopedic ward of the Memorial hospital at Johnstown, was formally inaugurated on Monday evening of this week at the regular meeting of the club.

This movement, incidentally one of the best charities that the folks in Northern Cambria are called upon annually to contribute toward, has to date taken care of eighty-two children in this section, correcting to the best of surgical science their handicaps, and in some instances perfecting complete cures. In addition to this eleven worthy young people have been sent to college.

The work must go on. More cases are constantly being brought to the attention of the Kiwanis club. Quotas have been fixed for each of the various north county towns, and chairmen have been named to conduct the drive in the various districts. H. O. Winslow, of this place, is the general chairman for the drive and in addition to this is the local chairman for Patton and vicinity. Patton's quota this year has been fixed at \$400. Last year the community raised \$500 for the cause.

St. Benedict this year has a quota to raise of \$200; Bakerton, \$225; Carrolltown, \$200; Cherry tree, \$125; Ebsenburg, \$200; Hastings, \$500; Moss Creek, \$200; Barnesboro, \$200, and Spangler, \$225. The campaign will run approximately four weeks and it is hoped that all the towns will contribute at least their quota. Anything above the amounts set can also be used to advantage by the Kiwanians in the work, and every last cent of the fund will be utilized in the cause, regardless of amount.

At the meeting Monday night, Geo. A. Clark, of Hastings, who has since the inception of the Tiny Tim Club, been the prime factor in this movement, was the chairman, and the speaker of the evening was the Rev. B. A. Peters, pastor of the Grace Lutheran Church, Altoona, who proved himself in the beginning of his address a humorist of no mean ability. However, when he warmed up to his discourse, that of instilling the spirit of the Tiny Tim movement in the hearts of his audience, he demonstrated his ability as a talker along serious lines. Miss Yvonne Yerger, of this place, was a pleasing soloist, as was also her sister, Mrs. Geraldine Furry, who is visiting relatives here.

All in all the fourth annual Tiny Tim drive has started off with enthusiasm and the movement is now up to the people themselves. The work is one of Christian charity and its success should be a great one indeed.
