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PROHIBITION IS NOW A STATE ISSUE, IT SEEMS.

Whether we like it or not, the Prohibition issue has injected itself in the issue of state politics—and that very strongly.

We have nothing more than the facts to state:

Former Attorney General Francis Shunk Brown, of Philadelphia, candidate for the gubernatorial nomination, has announced himself as favoring a referendum on the wet and dry question. His stand, however, failed to satisfy the wets who announced they would fight out the issue to a finish and are back of Thomas W. Phillips, an out and out wet candidate, who will stand no chance of election, but who will corral a mighty big vote that may or may not be a deciding issue as to the outcome of the two major candidates totals after the votes are counted.

As the situation now stands the leading candidates for governor and United States Senator are listed on the Prohibition question as follows:

Governor—Francis Shunk Brown, committed in favor of a referendum on the Prohibition issue; former Governor Gifford Pinchot, dry, and Thomas W. Phillips, wet.

United States Senator—Senator Joseph R. Grundy, committed to the Republican National platform in the 1928

election, which favored retention of the Eighteenth amendment and the Volstead act; James J. DAVIS, secretary of labor in the Hoover cabinet, not committed so far; Francis H. Bohlen, wet.

The injection of the wet question in the Republican platform is expected to have a more pronounced effect on the gubernatorial situation than on the race for United States Senator.

A declaration in favor of the Grundy candidacy by Governor Fisher is expected momentarily. When the Governor named Grundy to the vacancy in the U. S. Senate caused by the rejection of William S. Vare, he hailed Grundy as the Republican leader in Pennsylvania.

Lewis, the Grundy choice for the gubernatorial nomination withdrew, but he is popular among the people, and will likely be a candidate who can be nominated four years hence. Sam Lewis withdrew because he thought the party was bigger than the man, and desired party harmony.

The Republican primary battle in the state bids fair to be a bitter contest. Let us hope a united party develops from the strife.

ABOUT THE CONGRESSIONAL OUTLOOK IN THE COUNTY.

A few weeks back the Courier, and we support Russell Leech, of course, ran a story in support of Mr Leech's candidacy for Congress, which was later copied by the Cambria Freeman of Ebsenburg, and later republished by the Johnstown Democrat, who censured the Freeman for boosting anything Leech, but had not a word to say regarding the article itself.

The sum and substance of the original article appearing in the Courier was to the effect that Russell Leech should be returned to Congress because of the good he has done our district in the past as a Congressman—because of the added prestige he will have if he is returned by virtue of his longer term as a congressman—and because the district deserves added recognition which Russell Leech alone can give us—and no other.

Several other candidates have blossomed out at the last moment as Congressional aspirants. They may all be

good men—and they no doubt are. However, the Courier has stood squarely behind Russell Leech since the first minute he came before the people for a public office. We have never had reason to regret that stand. We are soliciting Republican support for J. Russell Leech again because we again feel that he is the logical man for the Congressional job.

JAMES B. SWAN FOR GENERAL ASSEMBLY.

A host of candidates have been announced by the Republican party for the General Assembly of Pennsylvania from Cambria county in the second district, which includes all of the county outside of the city of Johnstown, and of which we have three to nominate and elect.

In the northeastern section of Cambria county, of which Patton is basically a part, only one candidate has announced himself, and that man is James B. Swan, of Glasgow, Reade township. Mr. Swan is a man in every way capable of filling the position, and if there is any section of Cambria county that needs have its neglect brought before the state, especially in the matter of good roads, it surely is northeastern Cambria county.

Patton, of course, is blessed with good highways, but our nearby neighbors—geographically, fundamentally and otherwise—have been neglected. True, a state highway is being constructed from Ashville to the Fallen Timber concrete road connection, but there is an important population, and an important community that seems destined to wait awhile for their much needed

roads—and they have waited long and vainly, too—and that is sections of White, Reade, Dean and Chest townships.

A representative in the general assembly from this district may or may not be productive of good. But a representative from this particular section of Cambria county can surely be relied upon to do his utmost to be of good to the community from which he resides. Mr. Swan is the congenial station agent of the P. R. R. at Glasgow. In his home section he needs no introduction. But in our section and in the communities that the Courier is reaching week by week he is deserving of the vote and support of Republican voters at the May primaries. Remember you have three candidates to vote for—and you should by all means make Mr. James B. Swan of Glasgow, Reade Township, one of the three for whom you mark your ballot.
