Thirty-Five Years Ago This Week.

Alice A. Ashcroft opened a millinery store in the Solomon building.

There were 132 inmates in the Cambria County Almshouse.

"During the late floods W. J. Donnelly the lumber merchant has been in his glory. He has a large force of men running the logs in the woods down Dry Run to the saw mill by the aid of what is known as 'splashes' which are produced by several small dams at intervals along the streams.

At times the work becomes very exciting and interesting. The creek is so narrow and crooked at places that the magnitude of the jams which form cause considerable work to liberate the timbers so they will move down the stream again. A representative of this paper was present during two of the splashes on Saturday. Mr. Donnelly expects to have all of his logs at the mill during the next flood."

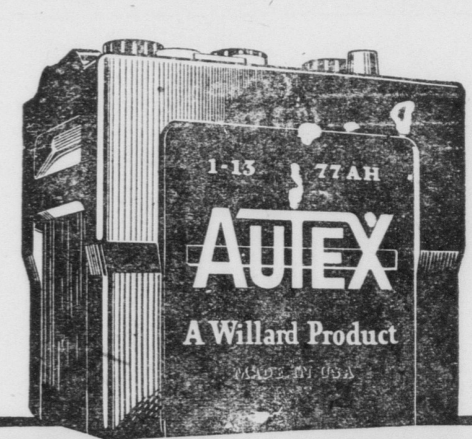
