**VICE PRESIDENT  
OPENS EXPOSITION**

Everything for Entertainment  
and Education At Ebensburg  
This Week.

Two men topmost in American affairs—one as vice president of the United States, the other as head of Bethlehem Steel Corp.—Monday mildly ushered in for a first-day throng of 12,000 Cambria countians and their guests this week's county industrial exposition.

Facing a capacity-crowded grandstand in the midst of the costly Schwab playground, Vice President Charles G. Curtis, in his capacity as principal guest, re-echoed happy, optimistic sentiments in regard to the country's economic future which he had addressed an hour before to 1,000 prominent Cambria countians and service club representatives at a Chamber of Commerce testimonial luncheon in the vast reception hall there.

Charles M. Schwab, sponsor of the Cambria county fair-grounds and its ever-generous benefactor, was the other one outstandingly visitor at the formal opening, and he loaned unabashed in vigor and warm enthusiasm over the prospect of a most successful industrial exposition.

Glamor and spectacular display in some quarters marked the opening of the week's program. The fairway was lined with concession and refreshment stands, carnival wheels, fruit juice extractors and side-show features, even to the palm-reading expert.

The United States Marine band of 65 pieces, under the direction of Capt. Taylor G. Branson, having accompanied Vice President Curtis and his equally delightful brother-in-law and sister, Mr. and Mrs. Edward E. Gann, to Ebensburg, was given a flattering ovation by hundreds as it played in the huge dining hall and later under the race track.

One of the most interesting displays in the entire exposition is that of the Pennsylvania Association for the Blind. During the entire afternoon and evening interested visitors watched a blind man working at a loom, weaving rugs and dresses in a most expert manner.

The family of beavers in the duck pond near the arena also drew a large exhibit, sponsored by the Cambria County Sportsmen's association, consists of two full grown beaver, male and female, and three youngsters. To see the young beavers climb upon the backs of their parents and go for a swim in the pool was the cause of much amusement for children at the exposition.

**PINCHOT NAMED OFFICIAL G. O. P. PRIMARY WINNER**

Gifford Pinchot, six weeks after the primary election, was officially named Tuesday as the Republican nominee for governor, contingent upon the decision of the supreme court in the Luzerne county perforated ballot dispute.

The vote for Pinchot was 632,719 and Brown, 612,820. Thomas W. Phillips Jr., the "wet" candidate, polled 281,399 and Joseph D. Herben, Philadelphia negro, 7,896.

In the senatorial contest, Secretary of Labor James J. Davis, fell less than 100 votes of receiving a 240,000 vote plurality over Senator Joseph R. Grundy.

The votes for the rest of the statewide candidates were: Lieutenant governor, Republican, Shannon, 602,339; Armstrong, 415,759; Dorrance, 294,826; Thompson, 62,588; Democratic, Bard, 120,364.

Costs Placed On Alderman In Case Court Deems Trivial

The case was one in which George O'Neil, negro, was charged with disorderly conduct and the court served notice that similar action would be taken in the future where cases came on an appeal and the evidence showed nothing to sustain the charge.

**TWO CONVICTED IN THE HOFFMAN CASE**

Frank Cantilla Doomed to Die in Chair; Polubno Draws Life Imprisonment.

Two of the five defendants indicted in the Hoffman murder case have been tried at Ebensburg and both found guilty of murder in the first degree.

John Yesko, of Gallitzin, charged with fraudulent conversion, was found not guilty by a jury in Judge McKenrick's court, but directed to pay one-half of the costs, the other half being assessed against the prosecutor, W. J. Nolan.

Committee Will Start Drive on July 14th to Raise \$20,000.

Faced with the necessity of wiping out a sizeable deficit before needed improvements can be undertaken, Northern Cambria citizenry are pledging support to a campaign to raise \$20,000 for the Spangler hospital.

The campaign will be launched with a banquet at the Brandon hotel Monday evening, July 14, at which time volunteer workers from the various communities will meet with the members of the hospital staff and board of trustees.

As outlined by Jonathan Nicholson, president of the hospital board of trustees, the objective of the campaign will be to liquidate a loan floated some time ago to finance the hospital program during the business depression.

**DEATH OF MINER ENDS BIRTHDAY ANNIVERSARY**

Albert Booterbaugh Dies Between Mine Cars; 31 on Day of Tragedy

Crushed between two mine cars as he attempted to fasten a pulley, Albert Booterbaugh, aged 31, a miner, was killed instantly at noon Saturday—his birthday—in the Ambury mine of the Altoona Coal and Coke Co.

The tragic ending of the birthday anniversary was discovered a few minutes later by the victim's brother, Manuel Booterbaugh, who is employed in the mine. As near as could be determined, the man was killed when he was caught between the cars as they came together suddenly.
