

**SIX INJURED WHEN
THREE CARS CRASH**

Six persons were injured, one seriously, Monday night at 12 o'clock when three automobiles figured in collision at the foot of McCoy hill, between Cresson and Gallitzin, on the William Penn Highway. All of the injured were residents of Gallitzin. The three automobiles were badly damaged.

Francis Lynch, 19, son of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Lynch, of Gallitzin, was the most seriously injured. He suffered a crushed chest and a probable puncture wound of the lung.

William Harding, 19, son of Mr. and Mrs. Benjamin Harding, of Gallitzin, and driver of one car, suffering from lacerations of the face and a badly bruised head.

Fred Jones, 18, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. E. Jones, of Gallitzin, suffering from fractures of two ribs on the right side and contusions of the head.

Francis Drass, 18, son of Mr. and Mrs. Victor Drass, of Gallitzin, suffering from contusions of the head and face.

Michael McMahon, 43, of Gallitzin, suffering from lacerations of the head and loss of blood.

Mrs. Paul McMahon, 19, of Gallitzin, suffering from lacerations of the right knee.

Michael McMahon and his daughter-in-law, Mrs. Paul McMahon were occupants of a machine driven by their son and husband, Paul McMahon, and also occupied by a small son of the latter, Billy McMahon. The latter two escaped injury as did Earl Kent, of Gallitzin, who was a passenger in the machine driven by Harding. All of the other persons injured were passengers in the Harding machine. The third car to figure in the crash was operated by the pastor of the Polish Catholic Church of Lilly, who also escaped injury.

**YOU'LL KNOW IF HE
IS THE 'PHONE MAN**

A new method of identifying those of its employees whose duties necessitate their entering homes and business establishments has been inaugurated by the Bell Telephone Company. The company has issued to each employee whose work brings him in contact with the public a card bearing his photograph, typewritten name and signature. The cards replace the familiar metal, bell-shaped badge which installers, repairmen and others in the company's service had worn for many years.

In addition to the employee's photograph, name and signature, each of the new identification cards bears the signature of the head of the department with which the employee is associated. While the photograph on the card serves to establish the identity of the bearer in homes and commercial establishments, the additional check of having the possessor of the card furnish his signature also can be made, if believed desirable. The old bell-shaped badges have been gathered up and destroyed by the telephone company.

**ASK RESTRAINING ORDER
AGAINST OWNERS OF DAM**

A bill in equity was filed in the office of the prothonotary Saturday morning by Walter Parrish and Maude A.
