THIRTY FIVE YEARS AGO.

From the Files of The Courier of Thursday, July 11, 1895

"A few weeks ago Dr. S. W. Worrell of this place, received by express a present which he prizes very highly, but no doubt would be a "horrible" present for anyone who was not an M. D. It is the skull of an Indian Chief and was unearthed in Oklahoma by members of the Geo. S. Good railroad contractors. The piece of anatomy was sent Dr. Worrell by Geo. S. Good is supposed to be a young chief by the name of Black Cloud. The warrior was supposed to have been 30 years of age when he died and has been dead over 70 years."

"Owing to the severe wind on the Fourth of July the local committee was unable to send up the balloons as advertised."

"At a meeting held on the Fourth inst. plans were formulated for the organization of a G. A. R. Post at some convenient point in the north of the county."

"The people of Chest Springs celebrated the Fourth in an old fashioned way. One of the features of the day was a dance which was thoroughly enjoyed by all who attended."

"Thieves broke into the Catholic church and convent at Carrolltown last Monday night, but got little, Tuesday night a second attempt was made but the thieves were scared away."

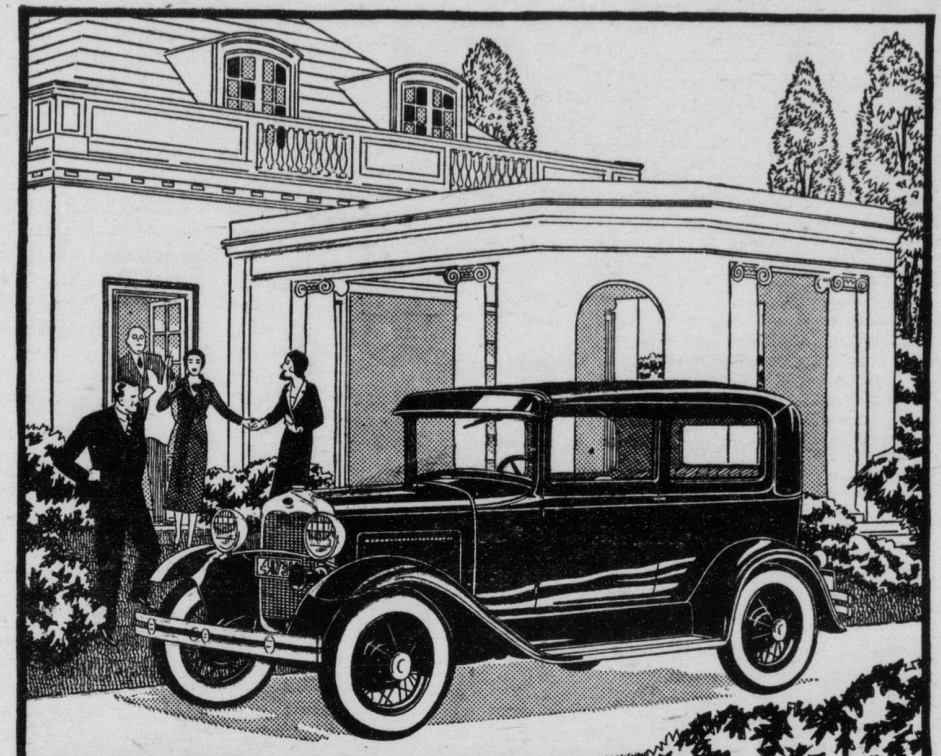
