DROUGHT REQUIRES MORE WATER TESTS

Owing to the continued dry weather, the Pennsylvania State Health Department's mobile laboratories have been ordered to remain in the field, Doctor Theodore B. Appel, Secretary of Health said recently.

These laboratories are testing individual sources of water supply in order that full protection may be given to persons living in rural communities against drinking contaminated water. Mobile laboratory number one is now operating in the Snyder, Union, Juniata and Perry county district, while unit number two is covering Bradford and Sullivan counties.

INDUSTRIES AID PURE WATER MOVE

Constant efforts of the Board of Fish Commissioners to minimize stream pollution is enlisting the co-operation of many industries, N. R. Buller, commissioner of fisheries, recently asserted.

Under the program of the Sanitary Water Board which has charge of the pollution of any of the streams in the Commonwealth, the Board of Fish Commissioners is authorized to prosecute those guilty where the evidence shows that fish were killed in addition to such prosecution the Fish Commission is authorized to obtain settlements from those responsible which will assist in restoring fish life to the portions of streams previously polluted.

Criticise Delay In Vaccination

Health Department officials to-day joined in urging parents to have young children immunized against both smallpox and diphtheria.

The warning followed study of reports by those in charge of the health examinations made by the personnel of the motor units which each summer tour rural districts.

In total of 8189 children examined, ranging in age from birth to school age, only 17 per cent. had been vaccinated for smallpox.

Dr. Mary Riggs Noble, chief of the pre-school section of the department, said the annual examinations always disclose a tendency for parents to delay the vaccination until a child has reached school age.

Dr. Noble asserted that because of high susceptibility to smallpox between the ages of 1 and 5, as well as beyond, all children should be vaccinated during the first year of life.

Despite the constant efforts of health authorities to have children protected against diphtheria the examinations showed that only in 16 per cent. of the cases had toxin-antitoxin been administered.

Only with the co-operation of parents is it possible to successfully carry on the constant fight against diphtheria, most dreaded of childhood diseases, Dr. Noble said. Such protection, she added, should be given all children as soon as they have reached the age of 6 months.

Personnel in charge of the health units referred 3426 children to family physicians for the correction of various defects.

TO SEEK WIDER FIELD FOR EMPLOYMENT AID

Peter Glick, Secretary of the Department of Labor and Industry, is sending letters to a number of authorities on employment matters, representatives of employers, labor organizations and personnel associations inviting them to attend a conference of district superintendents of the State Bureau of Employment. The meeting will be held to-day and tomorrow at a Harrisburg hotel.

The purpose of the conference is to consider developments of the service of the bureau of employment Pennsylvania Department of Labor and Industry and district superintendents have been assigned to various committees to formulate plans in connection with the subjects to be discussed.

It is planned to have the conference sessions confined to definite round table discussions on the various phases of the work of the Commonwealth's public employment offices and possible methods for development of the usefulness of this service. There will be no formal addresses. It is hoped that the consensus of opinion at this conference may be compiled as a definite guide to the State Bureau of Employment policies which may later be considered.

The conference will be solely for the purpose of determining how the Commonwealth's public employment service can be of most benefit to workers and employers of Pennsylvania.
