Service Thursday.

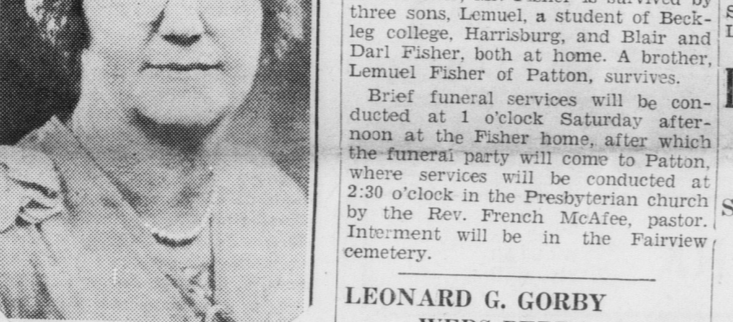
