

W. B. WILSON FOR PINCHOT

Secretary of Labor in Wilson's Cabinet Bolts Party to Aid Forester.

William B. Wilson, Secretary of Labor in President Woodrow Wilson's Cabinet, and candidate for the U. S. Senate on the Democratic ticket against William S. Vare in 1926, Saturday announced that he will support and vote for Gifford Pinchot, Republican, for the Governorship.

In a formal statement released Saturday from Pinchot State headquarters at Philadelphia, Wilson said:

"Recent developments in the campaign have strengthened me in my determination not to vote for Hemphill," Wilson said. "Aside from a number of selfish interests that are using the repeal of the Eighteenth Amendment as a smoke screen behind which they are fleeing the American people, there is no plunderer whose leaders know what they want, and how to get it, better than the leaders of the Philadelphia machine. And what they want would seriously demote the general welfare. I shall not go along with them. They are opposed to Pinchot because they cannot control him. I shall vote for Pinchot."

GEORGE H. EASLY, IS CALLED BY DEATH

George H. Easley of Johnstown, aged 60, a native of Carrolltown and a retired letter carrier, was found dead in bed Sunday morning at his home. Although his health had been impaired for a number of years, Mr. Easley was about as usual Saturday and retired about 10 o'clock Saturday night in apparent good health. Death was attributed to heart disease.

George H. Easley was born in Carrolltown June 7, 1870, a son of the late Atty. James C. and Josephine Scanlon Easley. He was a grandson of the late District Court Judge George W. Easley. Mr. Easley carried mail in Johnstown for a period of 30 years, retiring five years ago on account of his health.

In addition to his widow, Mrs. Rebecca Doyle Easley, Mr. Easley is survived by the following children: H. Francis and Paul J. Easley, both of Pittsburgh; Clair Easley, New Kensington; George W. Easley, a student of the Pitt Junior college at Uniontown; Carl Easley, du Pont place, and Earl and Sarah Easley, both at home. Two grandchildren are also surviving.

Mr. Easley was a brother of Mother Rose Marie and Sister Mary, both nuns of the Holy Name convent, San Antonio, Fla.; Henry Easley, Hastings; Mrs. John Hurley and Gertrude Easley, both of Carrolltown, and Walter B. Easley, Seward.

Funeral services were conducted at 9 o'clock Tuesday morning in St. John Gualbert's Catholic church, Johnstown. Interment was in the church cemetery in Geistown.

LEGAL NOTICE.

RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF GAME COMMISSIONERS DECLARING CHEST TOWNSHIP, CAMBRIA COUNTY OPEN TO THE KILLING OF DEER WITHOUT VISIBLE ANTLERS IN 1930, AND PRESCRIBING THE RULES AND REGULATIONS OF HUNTING FOR AND KILLING SUCH DEER DURING SUCH OPEN SEASON.

"Now October 1, 1930, pursuant to power and authority vested in the Board of Game Commissioners of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania under Article V, section 511 of the Act of the General Assembly, approved May 14, 1925 P. L. 752 be it resolved: That the Board of Game Commissioners of this Commonwealth, being duly informed upon information obtained, that deer have become destructive to property, and that the deer herds should be reduced in the Township of Chest County of Cambria, State of Pennsylvania; and being satisfied that conditions warrant it, hereby declare the Township of Chest County of Cambria of said Commonwealth, open to the killing of deer without visible antlers, weighing 60 lbs. or more with entrails removed, through the use of legal fire arms, as hereinafter provided, during a special season of three days, to wit: Beginning on the 27th day of November, 1930, and ending the 29th day of November, 1930, both of said days inclusive.

The rules and regulations for such hunting during the said open season shall be as follows:

1. The persons entitled to hunt for and kill deer, without visible antlers, during such open season in the said County, shall be such only as have obtained a special deer license from the Board at Harrisburg, Pennsylvania, in the manner prescribed by Section 511 of the Act of 1925 P. L. 752 of this Commonwealth.

2. The number of licenses to be issued for hunting in said county shall be limited to 240, and are to be issued in the order of applications made to the Board at Harrisburg, Penna., and to residents of Pennsylvania only.

The special deer license issued to any person on payment of a fee of \$2.00 shall entitle the holder to hunt for and kill one deer without visible antlers, weighing 60 lbs. or more with entrails removed, in the Township of Chest in the County of Cambria only.

The special deer license issued to any person without fee shall be good only on the lands in said County upon which such person reside and cultivate and entitles the holder to kill thereon one deer without visible antlers.

Except as herein provided, the hunting for and killing of deer without visible antlers during such open season, shall be subject to the provisions of the game laws of this Commonwealth relating to killing of male deer.

Any person violating the provisions of this resolution, on conviction in a summary proceeding before a Justice of the Peace, alderman or magistrate, shall be sentenced to pay a fine of one hundred (\$100.00) dollars for each deer unlawfully killed, and for violating any other provision of this resolution \$25.00 and costs of prosecution, and on failure to pay said fine and costs shall be imprisoned one day for each dollar of fine imposed and costs of prosecution; pursuant to Article V, Section 512 of the Act approved May 14, 1925, P. L. 752.

That this resolution being adopted be entered on the minutes of this Board, published as provided by law, and duly certified by the Executive Secretary, and for the Act of the Board of Game Commissioners of Pennsylvania.

In lieu of a printed application blank, the same information written on a plain piece of paper will suffice, or Post Office: Occupation; Height; Color of Hair, Color of Eyes; Age; Resident Hunter's License Number and County Number.
