The district includes Cambria and Indiana Counties and parts of Clear-Indiana Counties and parts of Orthon field and Blair Counties. Forester Gray's report revealed that 201 fires were extinguished during the fail while only 181 were reported in the spring. The total number of fires

num several reserve crews were pressed into service during the season. Despite the large number of fires and the large area burned over the total extinction costs were held to \$11,183.25. The report showed that the everage cost of extinction per acre was

\$2.32, which was only 16 cents above the previous year when only 1,138 acres were burned over. Gray's report showed that 1,332 ac-res of timberland were burned over

and 3,021 acres of brushland and 463 acres of grassland were destroyed by fires during the year.

Nearly one-fourth of the total fires occured during the month of October the report showed. Forester Gray pointed out that October was the dry-est month of the year and forestlands

were virtual tinderboxes during the entire month. Approximately 700 acres of brush and timberlands were destroyed in the largest fire of the year which broke

out in Chest Township and burned into dioining Clearfield Township. The fire burned nearly two days before

being brought under control. During 1937, which was a banner year in the Gallitzin District, the largest fire reported for the year burned over only 65 acres.

The number of fires and average acres per fire were as follows: Cambria, 191 fires, averaging 10.79 acres; Indiana, 74 fires, averaging 14.32 acres; Blair, 62 fires, averaging 10.74 acres, and Clearfield 55, averaging

18.72 acres


