

STATE BUREAU LISTS CALENDAR OF '39 ELECTIONS

The 1939 primary election will be held September 12 and the municipal (general) election will take place on November 7, according to the calendar issued by the State Bureau of Elections.

While 1939 is preponderantly a municipal election year in Pennsylvania, there will also be state-wide election of four judges in November. A Supreme Court justice will be chosen for a 21-year term to succeed Chief Justice John W. Kephart, Ebensburg, who cannot succeed himself.

Three Superior Court judges will be named to 10-year terms to succeed William H. Kellar and Thomas J. Barrage, whose terms expire, and to succeed whoever is named by Gov. Arthur H. James as his own successor on the Superior Court bench.

The Cambria County ballot this year will be an unusually large one. Terms of office expire at the end of the year for one common pleas judge, district attorney, prothonotary, register of wills, and Clerk of the Orphans Court, recorder of deeds, three county commissioners, county treasurer, county controller, coroner and county surveyor.

Johnstown voters will elect a mayor, city treasurer, city controller, two councilmen and three school directors.

The 1939 election calendar follows: June 24—First day to obtain signatures on nominating petitions.

July 5—Last day for commonwealth secretary to send to county election boards a list of bona fide political parties within the state.

July 24—Last day to file nominating petitions.

July 29—Last day to withdraw nominating petitions.

July 29—Last day to file objections to nominating petitions.

Aug. 14—Last day to register for the primary election.

Aug. 14—Last day for receipt by election boards of removal notices.

Aug. 23—Last day to file nomination papers.

Aug. 28—Last day to object to nomination papers.

Aug. 28—Last day before the primary to change from party to non-partisan enrollment.

September 12—Primary election day.

September 15—Return boards meet at noon to compute and canvass the votes cast in the primary election.

September 18—First day for registration after the primary election.

Oct. 2—Last day to file petitions contesting the nomination of any primary candidates.

Oct. 7—Last day to register before the municipal election.

Oct. 9—Last day before the election to file removal notices.

Oct. 13—Last day for withdrawal of candidates nominated in the primary election.

October 13—Last day to file primary expense accounts.

Oct. 18—Last day to file substitute nomination petitions to fill vacancies of withdrawn nominated candidates.

Oct. 23—Last day to change party or non-partisan enrollment before the municipal election.

Nov. 2—Last day to petition courts of quarter sessions for audit of primary expense accounts.

Nov. 7—Municipal election day.

Nov. 10—Return board meets at noon to compute and canvass the votes cast in the municipal election.

Nov. 27—Last day to file petitions contesting election of any candidate.

Dec. 7—Last day to file expense accounts for the municipal election.

Dec. 27—Last day to petition the Court of Quarter Sessions for an audit of municipal election expense accounts.

GALLITZIN RAILROAD TUNNEL PLACED IN USE 85 YEARS AGO

Gallitzin—Eighty five years ago last Thursday the first train passed through the famous Allegheny Mountains tunnel, located at Gallitzin, marking the beginning of a new era of transportation in the western part of Pennsylvania.

First big railroad tunnel constructed in the United States, the Gallitzin tunnel was completed on February 15, 1854, and the first train chugged through on the same date enroute from Philadelphia to Pittsburgh.

The tunnel was built chiefly to eliminate the hazardous crossing of the Allegheny Mountains by was of the previously state-owned Allegheny-Portage Railroad, connecting link with the old Pennsylvania Canal, and to afford quicker transportation between the East and West than the round-about route through the Great Lakes and Erie Canal.

Total length of the tunnel is 3,750 feet. It is located 2,158 feet above sea level, highest main line point of the Pennsylvania Railroad system.

Construction of the tunnel was started on October 14, 1851, when Samuel Vaughn Merrick was serving as first president of the P. R. R. It was completed during John Edgar Thompson's term as president of the company.

Chief engineers on the job were Edward Miller and H. Haupt. John Butler & Sons were the contractors and Thomas Seabrook and Thomas Reilly served as engineers.

Work on the tunnel was done entirely by hand. According to old-time railroad men, the tunnel was started on both sides of the mountain at the same time. The mountain was bored into a distance 600 feet, the dirt being hauled out by wheelbarrows or by carts drawn by horses.

Three shafts were then sunk and the slag was drawn up by a man-powered windlass. A sister tunnel was completed in 1904 and the old Portage tunnel was reconstructed and put into use in 1898. The latter tunnel gives the Petersburg branch of the P. R. R. a main connection at Gallitzin.

BOYLE KEEPS JOB IN UCD SHAKEUP

A shakeup in the Unemployment Compensation Division, ordered by the Social Security Board in Washington and carried out in Pennsylvania by the division's Board of Review, has reduced the number of district referees from 15 to seven, with Michael J. Boyle of Westmont, former county sheriff, being one of those retained, it was announced last Friday.

Philadelphia to Pittsburgh. trenchment move, ordered partly as an economy measure and partly to conform with a policy change obviating UCD appeals. Boyle's district which formerly included seven counties, now includes 10. They are Huntingdon, Blair, Cambria, Indiana, Washington, Westmoreland, Greene, Fayette, Semerset, and Bedford.

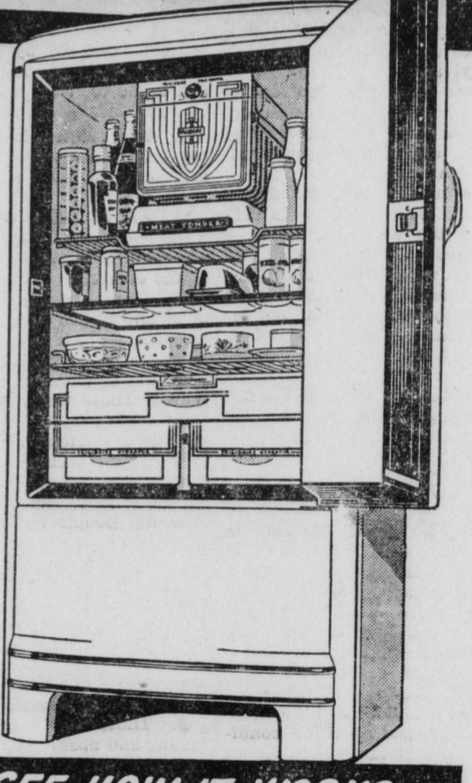
