M'CANN URGES COUNTY TO PURCHASE LAND

Ebsenburg — Presiden Judge John H. McCann last Thursday urged that the county purchase three lots opposite the court house on the north, extending from Lloyd Street to the Ebsenburg Trust Building at High and Center Streets. He also suggested that the county purchase that building, which is owned by the State Banking Department. The three lots have a total frontage of 199 feet with a depth of 140 feet. The building has a frontage of 65 feet and is 130 feet deep; is four stories and of brick. The lots are owned by the banking department, Summit Lodge, F. & A. M. of Ebsenburg and Mrs. Annie M. O'Connor of Johnstown.

Judge McCann first made the suggestion last Thursday to Michael Nedimyer, forman of the county grand jury. He urged that "moral support" of the jury be given to the idea, declaring that the county soon would require more space outside the courthouse. The jury in its report to the court, however, failed to mention the proposed purchase.

The plan was again outlined by Judge McCann last Thursday afternoon at a meeting with Judges Ivan J. McKenrick and Charles C. Greer; County Commissioners John Thomas, Jr., and Frank P. Hollern; County Solicitor George M. Spence; and Fred H. McFadden, Lawrence Edwards, S. H. Jencks and Frank Dorr, members of the Ebsenburg Borough Council and Attorney Clarence E. Davis, borough solicitor.

Suggestion was made that the county and borough might join in buying the three lots, which are used at present for parking.

KEPHART PICKS BLAIR'S JUDGE AS SUCCESSOR

Altoona — Chief Justice John W. Kephart of the Pennsylvania Supreme Court said last Thursday night it was his "sincere wish" that Judge Marion D. Patterson of Blair County succeed him on the high court bench. The chief justice, whose 21-year term expires this year, spoke to some 220 lawyers at a legal institute arranged by the Blair County Bar Association.

"It is my sincere wish," he said, "that Judge Patterson will succeed me as a justice x x x. It is my wish that a neighboring county in the central part of the state will be represented on the highest tribunal in the person of Judge Patterson." Justice Kephart's home is in Ebsenburg, Cambria County.
