Mrs. Bridg Callahan has returned home from Pittsburgh after spending several months with her daughter and son-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Alan Hester.

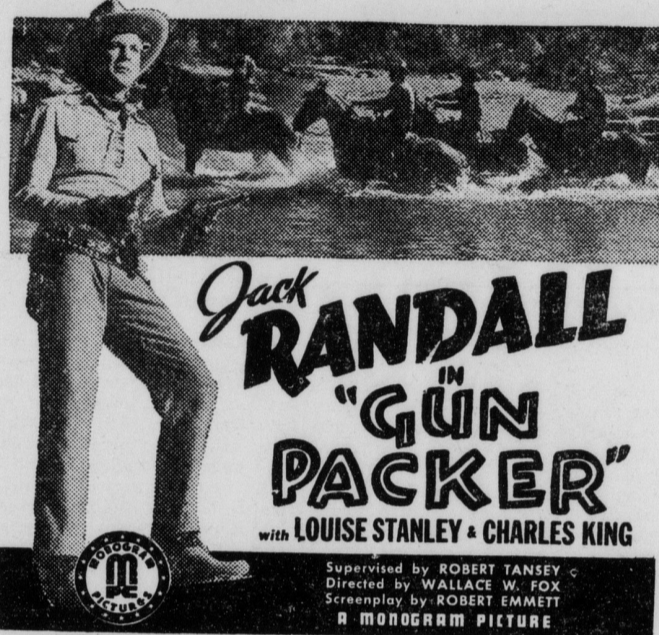

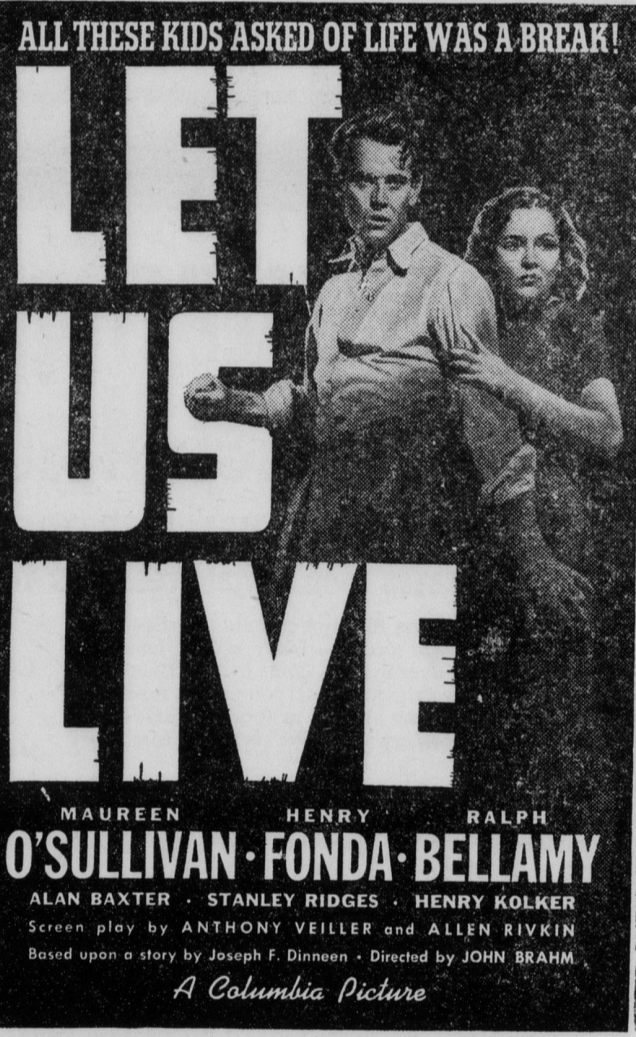

NEW LAW ALLOWS AN EXTENSION IN THE TAX SALES MATTER

With the passage by the legislature of a bill permitting counties to postpone the sale of properties against which delinquent taxes are owing, the plans to put some 3,000 Cambria county properties under the hammer in April, have been abandoned.

J. Lloyd Jones, county treasurer, said his office would have been forced to sell 3,000 properties against which taxes were owing for 1935, 1936 and 1937. Treasurer's sales have already been held for properties on which the taxes were delinquent for a longer period.

The new law, permitting postponement until August will mean, Jones said, that owners who wish to save their properties will have another period of time in which to arrange to meet delinquent tax accounts. The sales are inevitable, he said, and it is unlikely they will be postponed after August of this year. A proposal to delay such sales until next year was rejected by the legislature last week.

COUNCIL SCOUTS PLAN TO STAGE JUNE CAMP-OREE AGAIN, CRESSON

The annual camporee and pilgrimage of Cambria County Boy Scouts to the monument of Admiral Robert E. Peary in Cresson will be held June 15, 16 and 17, it was decided at a recent meeting of the council camping committee.

According to tentative plans the pilgrimage to the monument will take place on Saturday, June 17th. Every Scout in the Admiral Robert E. Peary Council has been invited to participate in the camporee and pilgrimage.

Representatives from all of the troops in the council are expected to journey to the Cresson park on Thursday afternoon and camp at the site until Saturday evening. Roger Cann, assistant executive of the council was authorized by the committee to complete details for the camporee, which annually is one of the highlights of the scout program.

GREENSBURG MAN TAKES OVER FRED HOGAN'S JOB IN DISTRICT WPA WORK

A Greensburg man came to Johnstown Monday to replace Fred J. Hogan of Spangler, resigned supervisor of operations for Area No. 11 of the Works Progress Administration. The new division head is James Higgins of the Greensburg area WPA office.

John S. Ginter, director of this area said Higgins is the second Greensburg man to be assigned to high salaried jobs in this area. Frank B. McAneny, a former Johnstown, was recently sent from Greensburg to succeed Norman J. Harris of Ferndale as supervisor of the finance division.

Higgins has been with the WPA and other federal engineers about five years, it is said. For a time he was head of operations in Indiana county and later was moved into the area office at Greensburg.

Harrisburg.—Half of the employees of the State Revenue Department's Safety Division, charged with investigation of accidents and supervision of auto inspection garages, have been dropped in the economy program of Governor Arthur H. James.
